

We learnt about the birds we can see in our garden and thought about how hard it was for them to find food in the winter months. This led onto us making bird feeders using seeds, raisins, coconut and of course lots of lard. We also made some binoculars to help us watch the birds and while we were

The Beaches Community Car Service, offering a voluntary service to take residents of Waterbeach and the surrounding area to doctors, dentists, hospitals and other essential appointments, began operating on April 1st 2009. This year we will celebrating our 15th anniversary. A number of our team members have been with us since then; we are getting older and are not able to do as much as we would like. Over the years we have had a good number of drivers who have served willingly for as long as they were able. Four of the present five coordinators have been doing the job since the scheme started. They are not as young as they were! Now the supply of volunteers seems to be drying up. To enable BCCS to keep on providing the vitally essential service that we do, we really do need more drivers and coordinators. Coordinators don't necessarily drive but arrange the drivers for requested lifts. A mileage allowance is paid.

BCCS offers an essential service for people who have no other means of getting to important appointments and it would be a great loss to Waterbeach, Landbeach and Chittering (also Milton and Horningsea) if this service could not continue due to lack or drivers or coordinators.

WAY



Waterbeach and Landbeach Action for Youth (WAY) is a free, Open Access youth club that operates two

nights a week, Wednesday and Thursday from 6.30pm to 8.30pm at the Tillage Hall. This welcoming space caters to all secondary school aged children, drawing members from Waterbeach while extending an open invitation to young people from the surrounding villages.

Durina the Christmas holidays, initiative Activity Food and (HAF) successfully engaged 43 vouna participants over the 16 hours that we were open. Our enriching activities included Christmas quizzes, pottery decorations and video productions utilising our newly acquired green screen. Our HAF provision is a collaborative effort, jointly funded by the government to benefit individuals receiving free school meals and supported by the Waterbeach Parish Council, allowing us to extend its accessibility to all youth within the parish.



This term our regular Thursday night sessions have seen a decline in attendance from older members, presumably (we hope!) as they are knuckling down to revise for their impending exams. We have therefore taken the decision to broaden access on Thursday nights to all secondary school aged children. This now means that all of our members can now attend both Wednesday and Thursday sessions. We will closely monitor attendance and behaviour, with the potential to welcome new Year 6's after Easter – stay tuned for updates on our social media channels.

Elaine Hart, our very capable Lead Youth Worker, continues to head up our youth work team and is aptly supported by Leanne, Lewis, Megan and our Trainee Youth Worker, Hezzie. Their dedication to our young people is the key to WAY's success when many local villages are losing youth provision. We would not be able to run WAY without the incredible support we get from local residents - be it through volunteering or being on our board of Trustees. We continuously seek new individuals to contribute ideas and skills or assist us in any way. Regardless of background or profession, we encourage anyone with an interest in developing local provision for young people to get involved. Our Trustees meet 8 times a year and play a pivotal role in our development.

WAY is fortunate to receive financial backing from a number of local residents who have established standing orders, providing a constant source of funding for our youth club. As grants become more challenging to access and increasingly burdensome to administer, we express immense gratitude to these individuals.

Patient Participation Group

The Core PPG group meets monthly, via Zoom, with Bruce Abel, the Practice Manager at Waterbeach Surgery. At that meeting we are told of what is going on at the surgery re staffing, communications, vaccinations etc. and we are able to ask questions and raise concerns. If you would like to receive notes of the meetings, they are sent to all members of both the Core and Virtual PPG. All patients can be part of the Virtual PPG. In addition, I can email you the health information in a newsletter that is published regularly by the Communication team at the Integrated Care System (ICS). This month for example, it gives advice to those waiting for surgical procedures, asks for views on NHS111 urgent care service, vaccination clinics for measles and the role of local pharmacies in giving help for common conditions.

Waterbeach PPG are setting up a Public Community Meeting to ensure residents are aware and reassured about the plans for health care in the New Town and how it impacts on our health care provision in the village. There will be representatives from Urban&Civic, Malling Health (who run our surgery), and the Integrated Care Board (ICB), who run the provision of healthcare for all of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.

We visualise that presentations will explain the plans for the future. We can submit written questions before the meeting and have an opportunity in an open forum, too.

Herons' Preschool



In January we celebrated being in our beautiful building for 3 years- how that time has flown by and the changes and improvements that have happened during that time have been huge! And we are still improving and evolving to make our preschool an exciting and happy place for all.

Did you know at Herons' we have......

Our own Forest School! - Here at Herons' Preschool, we have set up our own Forest School and you will find our site on the Preschool grounds, using



our trees and natural environment. Sessions take place twice a week on a Monday and Wednesday afternoon and the Forest School sessions are available to all the children, they access it all year round no matter the weather. Children are given the time to explore and to be individuals, to take responsibility over their own beliefs and attitudes, to look further into nature and their environment.

Behind the experience's children can benefit from social skills and empathy for others, by working in groups or as individuals, being valued and respected by the people around them and achieving a deep level of learning.

We aim to help the children to be happy, confident, resilient individuals ready for the big wide world.

We give the children the opportunity to problem solve, use tools, play in the mud, climb trees and to look at their environment in a different way - We love Forest School at Herons'!

Fish - At Herons' we have an amazing round fish tank with 4 fish - names keep changing and it's hard to figure out which one is which! We decided to

add the fish tank to our preschool to aid the children learning and to help create a calm area. Fish can help with calming emotions and watching them gives the children a few minutes to think - the bubbles are very mesmerising! The fish also help the children to look after something other than themselves - they know that the fish need to be fed and why.



Herons' Holiday Club - We started the Holiday Club last year and this takes place in the Easter and Summer holidays. We added this to our services after listening to parents needs and seeing a need in the village for this type of

provision for preschool children. We have a great time at our Holiday Club with lots of different activities including cooking every day and every afternoon is filled with exciting Forest School sessions including cooking on the fire.

Date for your diary - Just to let you all know, we have our Mother's Day Stall again this year. We will be on the village green on Saturday 9th March selling beautiful planters and cakes for you to buy for those special people! Please come down and support us if you can.

Waterbeach Day Centre

We're still desperately in need of a new treasurer to keep us going after our AGM at the end of March. We also need new members; a couple of our members have written what the Day Centre means to them.

'I go to the Day Centre at Denson Close, Waterbeach twice a week on a Monday and Wednesday. I must say everyone is very friendly. There is a lovely atmosphere. Would be nice if more people could join us. We have a two course meal cooked for us, with tea and cakes in the afternoon, also entertainment. Do make an effort to come and join us please.'

'Why I come to the Day Centre - Most people here know each other and are comfortable talking about local situations with local people. I am an incomer, someone who was so unable to mix with anyone, 10 years looking after a husband with Alzheimer's deprived me of social activity and moving to Chittering left me totally isolated. I needed a real push to get beyond the mental block of mixing, or even talking to anyone. The group here I feel, needed an effort as I did, to actually help me and eventually include me, and I found even if I didn't know anyone, I enjoyed listening and even learning about other people's lives. Gradually I found myself feeling more comfortable amongst a group of people that I had nothing in common with. My life had been one of isolation and a life of non-contact, so I thank the Day Centre, all who run it and my kind driver Peter, who without him I would be unable to come here. This place has not only given me the company I need in my life, but I like to think has radically changed my attitude and capability, I once more mix with people who make me laugh again.'

'We have delicious home cooked meals amongst lovely people in a comfortable and warm place. Afternoon tea and cakes.'

At present we are only meeting on a Wednesday 10-30 till 15-00 until we get some new members, this is to keep the cost of the day down for the members. If you would like more information and like to join us, please contact either Mary on 01223 564666 or Shirley on 07767 793505.

The musuem tells the story of the former airfield from 1938 when Winfold Farm land was bought for a war time airfield and then the RAF arrived in 1941. The Royal Engineers took over in 1966

until they left Waterbeach in 2012. The site is now being developed as Waterbeach (New Town).

Thanks to grants from Waterbeach Community Association and Waterbeach Parish Council the Museum is shortly expecting the arrival of four new display cabinets which will enable us to display more artefacts. She lives near Stowmarket and is the great, great, grand-daughter of Sir Michael Foster who produced many new varieties of irises. She now holds the official Foster iris collection in her garden.

In March we will be visited by Nigel Start who will be giving us advice about what to prune and when to achieve the best results. Twigs Way will be our speaker in April and will be explaining the history of the grounds of Belhus House near the M25 in Essex. Our final talk before the summer break will be in May when Gary Matthew will be telling us about the gardens of Easton Lodge.

Visitors are welcome at all our meetings (£5 on the door) and new members can join for a reduced rate during the year. Our meetings start at 7.45pm in St John's Church Room on the third Thursday of the month.

Cam Sailing Club

The Frostbite Spoon was competed for on Boxing Day, followed by a welcome hot soup and a festive catch-up in the clubhouse afterwards. This was the last sailing event on the 2023 Fixture List.

With winter being very wet this year it was no surprise in early January to see the club grounds flooded when the river topped the slipway and quickly cut off the dinghy park. The majority of the dinghies were securely fixed and stayed put, though a few floated from their moorings but fortunately stayed within the club grounds. As the clubhouse is built on slightly higher ground it invariably stays dry, as it did again this year.

2024 is going to be a significant year for the Cam Sailing Club as it is celebrating its 125 year anniversary. There will be special sailing and social events held to mark this achievement, all to be revealed when the Fixture List is sent out to members soon.

However, before the sailing season begins the trees need to be pollarded and everything given a bit of a Spring Clean before early March when the dinghies will come out of the sheds and the cruisers put back on their moorings.

History of Cam Sailing Club Part 4. The Twenties

In 1920, the river by the open clubhouse was filled with dinghies and cruisers



so that members might hear the vicar of the Round Church Cambridge give thanks for Victory and Peace and to bless an oak memorial for the five members who had lost their lives during the war. The plaque, with two names of Second World War heroes added, now holds a place of honour in the current clubhouse.

In 1922 the Act of Parliament was set up to form the Cam Conservators whose jurisdiction was extended as far as Bottisham Lock. Licence fees for boats were authorised and became payable by club members. In 1924 the Conservators dredged the river and the Cam Sailing Club agreed to guarantee the sum of £25 towards the loss of grazing on the fields where the spoil would be deposited. However, the dredging was only partially successful since in July 1929 all racing was abandoned due to the weeds in the river.

Despite the decline in general racing the summer regattas continued and were very well attended. An innovation was the split regatta with a weekend regatta at Waterbeach followed by a three day regatta down the river. Matches were arranged against the Cambridge University Cruising Club which was the first time they had ever sailed in a match other than against Oxford. Also in 1924 the first 'golf', or what we would call putting, took place during the regatta weekend at Waterbeach. Golf on the main lawn was to become an important event and later a full nine hole putting course was laid out.

The club grounds had also fallen into disrepair during the war and great efforts were made to restore them. Flower beds were replanted and general repairs were made. A Ladies Pavilion was built on the site of the present clubhouse at a cost of £75. This was largely paid for by fund-raising by the ladies. This pavilion was a substantial structure built on high piers so that boats could be stored underneath in the winter. Curtains were fitted across two corners of the room where females could modestly change their attire for sailing.

Access to the club was now from the road instead of solely by river. Though the Waterbeach Lode still had to be crossed using a rickety punt at first poled across the dyke and later pulled with chains. Along the bank by the track there were up to eight houseboats moored. The main club lawn was kept roped off for the early season so that the hay crop could be taken. Also, at this time, a small piece of land was leased for car parking. In 1922 Mr. Shipp, the owner, was paid £1 a year for parking. By 1924 the field had changed hands and was now owned by Mr. Warrington. The land became known as Warrington's Meadow. Negotiations with him over car parking were unsuccessful and the club didn't have any proper car parking for years afterwards.

In 1924 what was to become a club institution was started. Three clubs, the Cam Sailing Club, the Cambridge Motor Boat Club and the Cambridge and County Motor Club came together to hold an Annual Ball. Known as the Three Clubs Ball this became an important annual event on the Cambridge scene during the 1920's and 1930's.

Waterbeach Bowls Club

During the winter a good number of our members have played indoor bowls at the Chesterton Club mostly in the league for outdoor bowlers. Whilst a learning curve for many of us it has been enjoyable and many of the games have been close fought. A few of us have also taken part in the Cottenham Bowls Club's short mat league. This is something we are happy to do and again many close games are played often with success. We have also arranged for members to get together for a meal which should be enjoyable.

It is the time to look forward to the next bowls season and whilst it is still in the future there is much to do before the first woods are rolled. Work will, of course continue on the green and its surroundings with members doing what they can to help. We shall hold our usual meeting to collect subscriptions and decide what still needs to be done before and after the season begins. We look forward to our roll ups and first games of the new season, the first of which is arranged for the end of April. We also need to hold the final of our pairs competition which could not be played last year. All this will take place under the name of Waterbeach Bowls Club to which we have reverted.

The Outdoor Bowls Season starts soon, it is great so many new to bowls came to our Open Days last year and decided to become members. We would like more people to enjoy playing on our excellent green at our friendly club. The new members last year have enabled us to form a new team in one of the leagues we already play in.

Waterbeach Bowls Club will be holding an Open Day on our Green on Waterbeach Recreation Ground on Saturday 25th May - 11am to 5pm. Young and old are welcome, males and females alike. We have woods available for you to try to see if bowls is for you. Please wear flat shoes.

Details will be found on Facebook nearer the time and on notices in the Community Association boards. The Open Day will coincide with the Colts Football competition. Anyone interested will also be very welcome to come to our pre-season or other roll ups. Again, details will be on Facebook or just call Chris Rushmer on 07712 940184 or Pam Black on 07751 730357 who will be pleased to tell you what is going on.

Many of you will know that we have been in discussions with Waterbeach Parish Council about a new building for the bowls club. Unfortunately, until now there has been no action to see construction take place. However, we are hopeful that recent discussions will finally lead to real progress. The bowls club will certainly do what it can to assist in the process.

We look forward to seeing participants and spectators during the season.

District Councillor Update

Civil Parking Enforcement (CPE): At the time of writing, fines are being issued for parking offences 'in contravention of restrictions in place.' This means that the CPE officers can only issue tickets for offences such as parking on single or double yellow lines or for obstructing a pavement adjacent to such lineage. Other parking matters, such as blocking a pavement or parking within ten metres of a junction, remain a Police matter. vou have information to feedback please parkingcontrol@cambridgeshire.gov.uk with the location of the restriction being contravened, the day(s) of the week and time when it usually occurs. plus the frequency. For further information on CPE please visit www.cambridgeshire.gov.uk/CPE

Cost of Living Support: With the ongoing squeeze on household finances, South Cambridgeshire District Council continues to offer support to those most in need. If you are claiming some benefits, or if you are not currently eligible but are struggling to make ends meet, you may be able to receive help with your council tax bill. 100% of the bill is the maximum award. Any award would be made directly from SCDC onto your Council Tax account. You can find out how much council tax support you are likely to receive by using the Benefits Calculator – please visit the South Cambs website.

Further support is provided through the Household Support Fund (a County Council scheme) which provides immediate financial relief. There are also twenty food banks and food hubs within the district. To access the food bank at the Baptist Church in Waterbeach (open on Thursday mornings from 11am – 12pm) you will need a food voucher. Although the weather is hopefully getting warmer, the council is providing free electric blankets to those receiving Council Tax support or a benefit connected to lack of mobility. In collaboration with Cambridgeshire Acre, the Council continues to support community-led free-to-use community hubs (formerly called warm hubs.) The Landbeach Community Hub is open on Wednesdays from 10.30am to 2pm at All Saints Church where tea, coffee and a hot meal is provided. What's in a name?

Smith's Corner - can the reader help?

In February 1919 Waterbeach Parish Council received a letter from Chesterton Rural District Council which asked that:

'A public meeting be called at an early date to consider the question of Housing and Sanitary arrangements in the village'. This was because there was a great shortage of decent affordable housing. Many rented homes for poorer people were in an appalling and insanitary condition in the years after the first world war and Lloyd George was promising 'homes fit for heroes', with public funding to pay for building them. A public meeting was held on March 4th 1919 and eleven applications for new houses were subsequently received. However, the Parish Council considered that at least twenty were required. In June 1919 Chesterton Rural District Council wrote to say that funding would be provided for twelve and asked for suggestions for suitable sites. These were duly submitted by the Parish Council along with the request that it could take part in the selection of the tenants (who would be renting them from the RDC) and a request for a bank in Waterbeach.

The site chosen was to be land on 'Hall Farm between Smiths Corner and the Slap Up'. Hall Farm occupied land where the riding stables are now and would have covered a wider area ninety years ago and bordered Cambridge Road. By 1919 it was owned by the County Council. Cambridge Road in those days continued along what is now called Old Cambridge Road because Car Dyke Road was not built until the mid1970's.

Mr. Wyatt, seconded by the Chairman proposed that 'a road be made from Smith's corner, Cambridge Road leading to the station and twelve houses be built adjoining thereto'. The road didn't happen but the three pairs of houses with a very distinctive style were built just before the turn into what became



the Recreation Ground and another three pairs were built further along what is now Old Cambridge Rd. These were I think the first council houses to be built in Waterbeach. The road never happened.

So, I think Smith's Corner would be the point where Cambridge Road becomes Car Dyke Road and Old Cambridge Road goes off to the right. However, I am none the wiser about who Smith might be. Has anybody ever come across him (or her?)



My theory that it might in some way be linked to William Smith Wiles who lived at the Rookery and whose family farmed a large area, came to grief when I went to check the source which I thought said the Smith Wiles family had leased some of Hall Farm. However I had misread it, and they didn't. So bang goes that theory. So far despite asking a number of people and doing quite a lot of searching and finding some interesting things, I have drawn a blank. If any reader knows more, please get in touch. Perhaps there was just a blacksmiths there. It would be nice to know

As a postscript: we might have had a much bigger change in the 1920's. Mike Pettys' Cambridgeshire scrap book for Waterbeach (a summary of items in the local papers about Waterbeach between 1897 and 1990) includes these intriguing headlines.

24th September 1919: Rural housing – suggested garden city at Waterbeach 22nd October 1919: Rural housing, proposed garden city at Waterbeach for 50 houses

I went in to the central library which houses a great collection of information about Cambridgeshire and was able to find the newspaper articles in which these headlines appeared.

Both are reports of meetings of the Chesterton RDC and are fascinating. The suggestion for a 'type of Garden City' for Waterbeach with 50 houses came in the 24th September meeting in a debate about raising money to build much needed new housing. Mr. Francis the chair of planning committee came up with: 'people in Cambridge would like to live in the country on Garden City terms and would pay good rents. The site would be fairly close to Waterbeach station' (not much help for poor Waterbeach labourers who would not be able to afford big rents though).

However, at the next meeting in October the Garden City concept was shelved because Chesterton RDC felt that the money which would have to be borrowed to build them would take away funding from other villages.

So, we just got 12 rather attractive council houses which must have been greatly welcomed an appreciated by village residents.

Being online singers can join from the comfort of home, even when they are feeling unwell. We sing with microphones turned off, which can actually be very liberating! You simply sing along with the leader, learning uplifting songs often in call and response style. We also use multi-track recordings so we can enjoy singing rounds and harmonies."

Do I have to pay? - Those who can afford it are invited to give a £3.50 donation each week, but this is not essential - we want everyone to be able to come.

Do I have to come along every week? - We know that appointments, sickness, family commitments and such can get in the way! Just come along when you can.

Repair Cafés

Repair Cafés are community events that match people who need stuff fixed with people who like fixing things. Experienced, volunteer repairers repair all sorts of household items such as kettles, toasters, lamps, laptops, clothes, toys, bikes and more.

Repair Cafés are completely non-commercial. There are no promises and no guarantees, but if something can be saved the repairers will do everything they can. Repairers are always keen to teach visitors how to do the repair themselves and at the very least watch while they do it. One of the aims of Repair Cafés is to encourage more repair.

There's been a Repair Café once a year in Waterbeach for the last 7 years. And there are many others in Cambridge and surrounding villages such as Histon and Cottenham. However, we know that interest in Repair Cafés is increasing and we'd like to hold more frequent cafés but we could do with more volunteers. We'd like to run them more frequently in Waterbeach.

We need electrical and electronic engineers, mechanical engineers, jewellery repairers, bike repairers, people who can sew, restorers of books/art/ceramics, carpenters and generalists. You can join a Repairers Register that lets organisers around Cambridgeshire know the locations you'd prefer, when you might be available and what skills you'd like to share.

No special skills are needed to help run and administer a Repair Café. Roles include publicity, organising bookings and helping out on the day.
