#### **News from Cllr. Peter Johnson**

We are slowly seeing the troops moving away from Waterbeach despite our protests and campaigns but with the formation of "Waterbeach Forward" we are starting to plan what happens next. We have formed a committee and are looking at what Waterbeach residents want to see on the Barracks site, I think that most people want some houses for local people but a development that enables our village to grow at a controlled rate. To say a blanket "No" could cause our village to stagnate so we have to accept growth but the village will be kept informed, consulted and another rally is planned for 8<sup>th</sup> September on the Green.

I have raised the issue of White Lines, or in many cases the absence of White Lines at many of our junctions, with Cambridgeshire County Council and I am waiting for a response as to when we can expect to see our White Lines restored before there is an accident.

The flooding problem at the Gault has now been resolved, there was a drain blockage, but this has been cleared and despite all the recent rain the path has been clear of puddles.

The ditch in Denny End Road has flooded again, but there has been a meeting with the Ely Drainage Board engineer and Anglian Water after I raised this at the WLIDB meetings. This has resulted in a map coming to light that showed Anglian Water to be the owners of this ditch and they have now accepted this. They need to put a camera through the culvert to see what the blockage is, but there is definitely going to be a marked improvement in this ditch.

Dog mess on the recreation ground is still a big problem and with the forthcoming Jubilee celebrations to be held on there we do not need this problem, it is hazardous to health and unnecessary. I ask all dog owners please clean up after your dog and keep the area clean and safe for all users.

Robson Court Hostel is now in the hands of Hereward Sanctuary, but there are still people living there and until they have been rehoused nothing will be done so there is a delay on the demolition.

Earlier this year a problem arose from the area around Pleasant View on the A10 being cleared of all trees. Thanks to all those who did contact me regarding this as I was able to get the Enforcement team in on a Sunday to check this out. It has turned out to be something the new owner was allowed to do and I hope that the immediate neighbours have been reassured that I am monitoring the site along with the Enforcement team for South Cambs to ensure that matters do not get out of hand. If any resident does see something going on that they are unsure of then please contact me so I can check it out for them.

I am honoured to represent Waterbeach, Landbeach, and Chittering as your District Councillor and I thank you for having the confidence in me and I will do the best I can for our villages. ### **Gardening Club**

The March meeting was a great success with a full attendance of members and guests to listen to Hilary Thomas' colourful talk on "Colour and Seasonal Excitement". The winter weather had had a devastating effect on not only the survival of many plants but on the timing of the daffodil flowering period. The effect on the second attempt at 'Have-a-Go Spring Show' was catastrophic, very few entries and only one First Prize (Roger Nichols) was awarded. The Club is not defeated and we will continue the trial but with a more general approach - more anon. The April talk on "The Fascination of Fungi" was given by an enthusiastic local mycologist, Peter Walker. The range of forms, colours and even chemical methods used in identification of the larger fungi were illustrated and the care which a field mycologist has to take in separating the edibles from the inedible or absolutely lethal was stressed. The mycophagists in the audience went away somewhat The fungi have always been of importance to the gardener: reassured. usually as pathogens, typically the rusts, smuts and powdery mildews; but recently the beneficial relationships between plant-root systems and fungi, as mycorhizal associates, has shown how the mutual support each gives to the other as transfer of food to the fungus and the extraction of minerals from the soil to the plant. Now gardeners can purchase a commercial mycorhizal preparation to establish rapid and luxuriant seedlings and adult plants. Peter had kindly agreed to lead a local Fungal Foray in the autumn watch for the poster.

The important event in the Club's year is the Annual Show in September: an opportunity to exhibit triumphs of horticultural skill and win prizes. The Show is not just for adults: to allow children to show their gardening skills, creative talents and culinary achievements the 2012 Show Schedule has been revised. ### **Waterbeach Barracks**

An update from Colonel Andy Philips, Commander Waterbeach Station.

"I undertook to give you regular updates on our rebasing plans. Since I last wrote to you on 25<sup>th</sup> January, we have made steady progress and although we still have much to do, I can now give you additional information on our rundown plans that will be of interest to you.

The original rebasing timelines remain unchanged; the main body of 39 Engineer Regiment will move from Waterbeach to Kinloss in July 2012 and the main body of Headquarters 12 (Air Support) Engineer Group will move from Waterbeach to Wittering in October 2012. The vacation and hand-back

of Waterbeach Barracks to the Defence Infrastructure Organisation will be completed by the end of March 2013.

Once the main bodies have departed, a closure party of approximately 40 personnel (military and MOD civilians) will remain, and this will gradually ramp down through to March 2013. After that, the Barracks will be guarded and managed by the Defence Infrastructure Organisation until they dispose of it.

We expect 40-50 of our families to remain in military housing at Waterbeach after the main body moves. About half of these will probably move on within 6 months, with the remainder staying for a year or so. It lies with the Defence Infrastructure Organisation to decide what to do with the houses once they are vacated. They are still working out their plan, but it will probably include the retention of some quarters (number to be determined) to provide for service personnel working in the Cambridge area with the remainder being handed back to Annington Homes for disposal. We do not expect to see the details of the disposal plans, which are unlikely to be finalised for some time yet.

Our plan for closing down the facilities in the Barracks is as follows:

- The Buchanan Centre pre-school group will close at the end of the summer term.
- The airfield training area will close to military units, including the Cadets, at the end of November.
- The golf, fishing, clay pigeon and model aircraft clubs will finish within the camp by the end of December.

I'm afraid that extending any of the above beyond the dates stated is not something we are able to do; we are heavily committed from the middle of the year, including supporting the Olympics, and we simply do not have the management or manpower required. We will also be unable to provide formed contingents for the various Remembrance Services we normally support, although we hope to be able to send a representative to each for 2012.

We intend to mark the closure of the Barracks on the weekend of the Waterbeach Feast. There will be a Beating Retreat ceremony in the Barracks on the evening of Friday 15th June, which will be open to the public, and we will be supporting the Feast as normal on the Saturday.

I hope this gives you a better idea of what we are planning and how it might affect you. If there is anything else you'd like to know, please let us know."

#### BEATING RETREAT AND FREEDOM CEREMONY

On Friday 15 June 2012 there will be a Beating Retreat and Freedom Ceremony at Waterbeach Barracks. Members of Waterbeach village are welcome to attend this event. The timings for the event are as follows:

1815hrs Main gate open to public where they will be directed to parking areas and

marshalled to the Regimental Square. Please note vehicle parking is limited.

1915hrs Beating Retreat commences.

2000hrs Beating Retreat concludes and will be followed by the Freedom Ceremony which

should last for approximately 20 minutes.

### **Library Facilities**

Waterbeach Independent Lending Library - The Library, located in the Community Room on the Waterbeach School site, has nearly ten thousand books, including over 250 large print books. If you already have a Cambridgeshire Libraries card this can be used at Waterbeach, or you can join the Library there to enjoy the benefits of all Cambridgeshire Libraries.

We can order books from other libraries for you, or you can order them yourself on-line, for collection at Waterbeach. Books borrowed from other Cambridgeshire libraries can be returned to Waterbeach.

Summer reading challenge 2012 - "Story Lab" - The Reading Challenge helps prevent the 'summer reading dip', encouraging children aged 4 to 11 years to continue reading over the summer period. The children are invited to read six books during the summer holiday, and are provided with a reading pack to get them started. With each book read, there are rewards to collect to transform the fold-out model of the Story Lab into a laboratory where children read, collect, share, create, and transmit stories. If your child, grandchild, or any child you care for, does not have a Library card of their own, get them to join now and give them the greatest gift of all, the power of knowledge through the written word.

(Registration for the reading challenge starts on Friday 6<sup>th</sup> July.)

### **Home Guard Spigot Mortar**

Most people walking along the towpath to or from the Clayhithe Bridge will have seen the strange round lump of un-obtrusive concrete with its integral

stainless steel rod, peering out from under the tangled mass of brambles and stinging nettles that now threaten to engulf it.

Although I suspect that quite a few won't have any idea of what it is or what its intended role was around 70 years ago?

This was the intended mounting for a weapon used by the Home Guard known as the Spigot Mortar. The Spigot Mortar, or "Blacker Bombard" was invented by a Lieutenant Colonel Blacker; Blacker's

idea was to create a cheap weapon that could be mass produced to help fill the gap created by the retreat of the British Expeditionary Force from the beaches of Dunkirk in 1940, during which it had lost most of its heavy weapons.

Demonstrations at Bisley in April 1941 convinced GHQ Home Forces that the weapon should be adopted by the regular army, and by the Home Guard as an anti-tank weapon.

As it turned out, the regular army didn't like the spigot mortar due in part to its size and weight so it was given en masse to the Home Guard.


The design of the spigot mortar was such that the firing of the weapon drove a steel rod, the 'spigot' into the bomb's tail boom. This ignited the charge and blew the bomb off the spigot. At the same instant the explosion recocked the weapon by forcing the spigot back into its housing and compressing the spring, readying it for the next shot.

Firing the mortar could put its crew at risk, as when a round struck its target the fins from the exploding bomb would fly straight back.

In its anti-tank role, with a 20lb warhead, the spigot mortar had a range of around 100yds. With the lighter 14lb warhead, in its anti-personnel role, this range was increased.

Maximum rate of fire was 12 rounds per minute for the 20lb bomb and 15 rounds per minute for the 14lb bomb.


Initially the concrete pedestal for the mortar would have stood in the center of a small pit 3 feet 10 inches in depth, with just enough room for the 3 man crew (the commander and his Nos 1 and 2) to be able to load and fire the mortar; the inner wall of the pit was to be revetted in whatever material was available, e.g. wire netting, wooden stakes, etc.

- 3. Stainless steel spigot for mortar.


Sometimes (and presumably space permitting) a much more elaborate structure was constructed, this consisted of a pit with an 'L' shaped trench and recesses for ammunition. fig 4.



The initial idea was for the spigot mortar to used in a mobile role and fired from its own set of legs, but by October 1941 this idea had been revised and 1,030

static mounts constructed from concrete had been put in place throughout the Southern Command area.

By July of 1942 the issue of spigot mortar's had ceased within the Southern Command area; in the end, from the mortar's early trials in April 1941 until July 1942 (when production stopped), 22,000 pieces had been delivered nationally.



### **WISE**(Waterbeach Initiative for Sustainable Energy)



Could this be heat escaping from your French Window? (it looks even more dramatic in colour! Paler means hotter!)

Very few readers cannot have been to Emmaus at some time to donate unwanted goods to go in the shop or to seek out furniture, books or bric a brac. It is also sells a jolly good cup of coffee and very nice cake. By the very nature of its business Emmaus

helps to increase the sustainability and reduce the carbon footprint of the district. Now the Community is starting to consider how the whole site can become even more sustainable by reducing energy use and costs and perhaps installing one or more renewable technologies. The difficulty has been knowing where to start.

In January this year WISE (Waterbeach Initiative for Sustainable Energy) worked with Emmaus to apply for a Local Energy Awareness Fund (LEAF) grant for an energy survey for Emmaus to help address this problem. The grant application was successful and the survey was carried out by a consultant from the National Energy Foundation. As part of this survey WISE members were able to borrow a thermal imaging camera from South Cambridgeshire District Council and take pictures to show where heat was escaping from the building one of which you see above. The light colour of the door shows that lots of heat is escaping through it.

The project has been very successful in enabling Emmaus to understand much more clearly what needs to be done to make the community more energy efficient and which renewable technologies might be most appropriate for the site. The project report included an Energy Saving Action Plan which the community is already working on. The report also suggested that replacing the oil boilers with a biomass system might be a good renewable technology option and this is being actively explored together with installation of solar PV panels to generate electricity.

While the Emmaus site was being surveyed WISE members carried out a visitor survey of 100 visitors to Emmaus to find out something about the way in which their homes are insulated, their energy use, attitude towards renewable technologies and what steps, if any, they take to try to reduce their carbon footprint. In these days of rising energy costs it was surprising that quite a high proportion of people appeared not to have done anything to see how they might cut down on their energy bills. However, others had

some very practical ideas, the most effective of which seemed to be fining the children £1 every time they left the lights on. Other less cruel ideas included: only heating one room if only one person was at home, lowering the central heating thermostat by a couple of degrees and adding another sweater, line drying clothes, and putting foil behind radiators.

There will be a display with more details of the findings of the visitor survey and the NEF survey at Emmaus in the café and the WISE stall at the Feast so come along and find out more.

Hopefully the wet miserable spring is behind us and we can all look forward to a long hot summer.

If you fancy a night under the stars, toasting marshmallows around the campfire and listening to the nocturnal wildlife of the fen – why not book a night or two at our wild campsite at a secret location on the nature reserve. The campsite consists of four basic rustic shelters which will protect you from the elements (sleeping eight children or five adults), a fire pit and ecotoilet. Access to the site is on foot or bicycle and you will need to be self sufficient carrying your own food, water and fuel (and taking you rubbish away of course). Thanks to the generosity and fund raising efforts of members of the Chelmsford, and Colchester and North Essex National Trust Association's we have been able to purchase two disability tricycles and a tricycle tag bike for our cycle hire fleet. If cycling is a little energetic for your liking then why not enjoy a peaceful cruise along Wicken Lode in our new electric boat, the Mayfly. Boat trips run 4 times a day at weekends and Bank Holidays and 2pm on weekdays. Trips last 50 minutes and cost £3.80 adults and £1.90 for children.

Last month the Trust launched '50 Things to Do Before You're 11¾', a major initiative to re-connect children with the countryside and nature. The list of 50 things include a range of exciting activities from skimming stones, making grass trumpets to tracking animals and camping out in the wild. ### Hedgehogs

Hedgehogs are in decline by over 25%, mainly due to farming practices. They have been around for more that 15million years. Here is how we can help



- Make a hedgehog sized hole (5" square) in fences and walls so that hedgehogs can travel from garden to garden. They need a large area to find enough food.
- Don't use pesticides or slug pellets
- Leave some of your garden wild for shelter and protection
- Check thoroughly for hedgehogs before strimming hedges, mowing grass, turning over your compost heap, moving your shed or lighting a bonfire.
- Keep pond levels topped up. Hedgehogs can swim, but make sure there
  is an escape route so they can get out.
- Provide a shallow dish of fresh water and food such as tinned meat based (not fish) cat food, crushed peanuts or preferably dried meal worms as cats don't eat them. Leave the food where cats can't get to it.
- Don't take a hedgehog from the wild, but if you find one that is out in the daytime, ill or injured, or still very young ring the British Hedgehog Preservation Society 01584 890801 who will give you advice and put you in touch with a carer. If you think there may be babies listen out for high pitched distress whistle.

### **Three Peaks Challenge**

A group of adventurous parents in the village took on the Three Peaks Challenge to raise money for new play equipment for the primary school after vandals attacked the previous equipment. The five parents joined a group of others in an effort to climb the highest mountains in Scotland, England and Wales, a total combined climb of over 3000 metres within just 24 hours.



The parents, Claire Glemas and husband Tom, Chris and Clare Mead and Grace Geneja wanted to help the school raise funds to replace the equipment.

Jane Green, head teacher at the primary school said "It is an absolutely fantastic effort by this group of parents, the whole school is delighted".

The group travelled up to Ben Nevis in Scotland and started their climb at 7am. Towards the top of the mountain they faced heavy snow and ice and poor visibility which added an extra challenge but the group managed up and back in five hours. It was then back on the minibus to travel to the Lake District to climb Scafell Pike, much of which was completed in the dark with the use of only head torches to navigate their way. They completed this in

good time before the tired team travelled across to Wales to climb Snowdon which they did at first light.

The tired but triumphant team completed their challenge in 23 hours and 20 minutes before heading off to a local hostel for food, a celebratory drink and some well earned rest.

So far the group have raised around £1300 towards the £20,000 required. Children at the school have already completed a sponsored silence and other activities to raise money for the project.

### **Family History**

Recently Beach News received a letter from someone researching their family history. Norman Long's family lived in the local area many years ago and he has some questions that you may be able to answer.

I am hoping you might help me find the answers to a few questions that came up while searching into my family history. They all have lived in and around Waterbeach since the 18th century and beyond. My immediate family is named Long, along with the Lowens family by marriage, and the Taylors.

My questions are as such:

Where were 'The Lanes'?....(The Longs 1918)

Where was 'Workhouse Hill' situated?......(The Taylors 1851)

Where was the 'High Road'?.....( The Lowens 1851)

The Lowens lived in Winfold Road in 1881

Are Denny Lodge Cottages 1891 the same as Denny Abbey Buildings 1901?..... nearly all the males worked as farm labourers, so I assume they lived in small farm workers houses.

I lived in Ely until 18yrs old, and remember the Green at Waterbeach...I was only familiar with the bus route!

One other thing...Is there any way I can access the school role for 1923 onwards when my father Charles Henry Long would have attended please? He was the youngest of seven boys and one girl at the school.

Lastly, is there a street map of Waterbeach of around 1850 to 1920 or thereabouts available that I could copy or see to locate whereabouts they lived?

As I am retired, and living in West Sussex, it is unlikely that I will come to Waterbeach again, but if I do it would be great to have a better idea of the area to help the search. If you can solve some of the questions, I would be very grateful. Any advice you can give will be wonderful to receive.
