WASPS is a friendly out-of-school club providing a home-fromhome atmosphere for children who are aged 4-11. Our main aim is to create an environment where the children can play freely with a variety of resources. We aim to give a little extra to their play time with playworker led indoor and outdoor activities.

WASPS has been running since 1997 and is a registered charity, regulated and inspected by Ofsted and managed by a small voluntary Management Committee made up of working parents/carers who use the Clubs. We have a great team in place led by our Joint Co-ordinators, Zoe and Wayne and two Holiday Club Co-ordinators, Tracey and Shirley. *Breakfast Club* opens at 7:45am before school. *After School* WASPS runs until 6pm. *Holiday Club* opens for most of the school holidays and Waterbeach Primary School inset days from 8am-6pm with additional activities on offer every day.

As always we had a busy Holiday Club this summer. Back from holidays we started with an aim to refurbish the outdoor space which, after more than 10 years of loving use, does need an upgrade. This has been planned together with Waterbeach Community Playgroup. We are resurfacing a very tired 'once-was-a-lawn' area that cannot be used after any rain, with an artificial grass which will be available for use in all weather. This year's fundraising by WASPS will go towards this project.

Together with WCP we would like to thank the Waterbeach Colts for their generous donation, which we will put towards the new play surface.

As part of our fundraising effort, on the evening of the 4th December we are running a "Pampered Chef" charity cooking show in the Playhouse. We are sure it will be a success. A percentage of all sales will go to WASPS. Watch this space and the Community Association information boards for further events this year.

Our children and staff are helping to raise money for Children in Need, as we are submitting this copy. This year we are treated to rice crispie cakes and a "Guess which UK landmark Pudsey is raising money at" game.

News from Cllr. Peter Johnson

I would first like to wish the residents of Waterbeach, Landbeach, and Chittering a very Happy Christmas and may 2013 be good for us all.

A major impact this summer was the loss of the direct bus to Ely but with persistence it has been re-instated. I know it is only two buses a day but that is better than no bus or the rather roundabout way of getting to Ely via Milton. So many people signed petitions, wrote letters and phoned Stagecoach which certainly helped get this result, but when I involved Stagecoach HQ in Perth this was the last push needed to secure our direct bus. But please remember that this route will be subject to remaining feasible in the eyes of Stagecoach so please use it whenever you can as bums on seats will be counted.

This year has been a year with yet more changes for our villages and I think the biggest change was to see the removal of the "Guardian of the Gate" the Hunter aircraft which has been a part of our village "scene" for many years. It takes the closure of the Barracks a stage nearer and with almost all of the troops being moved away our village is a little quieter and I am sure that some of the businesses are feeling the pinch. That makes it all the more necessary to use and support our village shops where possible as we do not want any of them to have to close due to lack of trade.

The consultation regarding planning and the possibility of more houses i0s now being looked at. Many people have written in to say what they would like to see and we all know we want to see more houses for our local people but we do not want 12,000 houses. Smaller controlled developments are needed and in this way we will retain our village identity yet provide the much needed homes. I have written to so many people to try and retain the sports and leisure facilities that the barracks provided. This has included Lord Coe, Sir Jim Paice MP and Sport England to name but a few and I am still contacting people in the hope that a last minute solution may be found.

The pedestrian crossing point is still on-going but we have been turned down for funding from the County Council. A further application will be made with the possibility of a slightly different area being identified, which may be more favourable. I know this is taking so long but we have to get it right and get value for money.

The Denny End ditch is now the responsibility of Anglian Water, a document was discovered at WILDB that clearly shows this fact and now work is underway to sort this long standing problem. A camera survey has shown that part of the pipe has collapsed so this is to be cleared and repaired and then every year it will be jetted out so the flooding of this area will be

resolved for good. Work is scheduled to start mid-November and from then on an annual maintenance check will be made.

It has been brought to my attention that there are still a few white lines that need repainting so I will be dealing with that. Unfortunately this is a job that may not get done until spring time as during the winter the roads surfaces are just not suitable for white lining, so please be patient but it will get done. Car parking for the station is clearly insufficient but using the old goods yard is a little way off. Network Rail are trying to get the previous leaseholder to remove his portakabin which is holding up proceedings but Network Rail are interested using this land as a car park. I am also trying to get bike parking facilities reinstated. The old bike shed is still there, very overgrown but it could be cleared quite easily and new sheds erected. This would give secure bike parking and clear the railings by Lodeside Caravan Park as bikes being left there are upsetting the residents of the caravan park. Of course with the franchises coming up no Rail company will be investing until after franchises are awarded, but I am in regular contact with Network Rail to see if they will spend some money as the land does belong to them.

It is a real privilege and an honour to be elected as a District Councillor to represent you all at South Cambs District Council and for that I say "Thank You". Landbeach Angel Lectern

One of the special treasures in All Saints' Landbeach Church is the large

wooden Angel Lectern. This is some 400 years old and was bought from an antiques dealer in York in 1882 for the sum of £13.10.0 (£13.50p). It came originally from a church in the Netherlands. You can imagine our distress when the angel was accidentally pushed over and damaged some months ago. Fortunately we have been able to have it expertly restored, and even had some of the fingers and toes that have broken off over the years replaced to make the figure complete again.



One feature that we had not noticed before is that



the book-rest is a finely carved piece of fretwork, which for as long as anyone can remember had been covered with two plain oak boards. Now we can see this as an extra decoration supported by the angel.

The Waterbeach Game

Every home in Waterbeach should have received a copy of In Hear it and Say, the Waterbeach Game, which was produced as part of the activities funded by the Public Art contribution from the Morris Homes development on Bannold Road.

The game set includes a map, set of character cards and a 'Book of Rumours'. The book includes fragments of stories from different points in the history of Waterbeach, going back 400 years. The character cards were created with pupils from the primary school and although they are fictitious characters, they are based on real people. The game includes a number of objects installed round the village, each of which references some aspect or aspects of the village's history. When the three elements - the objects, the characters and the stories in the book – are combined with stories that you bring yourself in your own experience of the village, the game is complete.

For those who are feeling imaginative, you can follow the instructions in the Book of Rumours and take on the characteristics of one of the characters in the cards and view the objects from their perspective.

In Hear it and Say was developed with a writer. Alongside the visual element, in the objects, the stories and characters create an imaginative and quiet space to reflect. The objects themselves represent poetic fragments of the past.

To see all the objects, the map provides the locations of the objects, each of which links in some way to stories of the past and to one or more of the characters. The map also shows the previous historic use of buildings around Waterbeach. The map is quite schematic but if you use the dark green triangle which represents the Green as your reference point the map falls into place.

The game set can be used to explore the village from the comfort of your home, with insights into the lives of previous residents and stories relating to the area around each of the art works. People who have lived in Waterbeach all their lives or for some time will be reminded of the stories and it will perhaps spark off further memories. A number of the incidents and people referred to have been featured in Beach News over the years and there is a set of back copies in the Waterbeach Library where you can find some very interesting reminiscences by local residents. For newer residents finding the installations and reading the stories about them in the book will start to tell you more about the long and interesting history of our village.

We hope that together, through this art work, residents will discover, imagine and create stories for Waterbeach, past, future and present.

Over the past year, there has been an almost complete change of Trustees at WAY. Last autumn, we lost the Revds. Robin Giles and Lucy Cleland. Robin retired from his position as Minister of Waterbeach Baptist Church, and Lucy said goodbye to her congregation at St John's and moved to Nottingham to take up a new position. In July this year, we were also very sorry to lose Quentin Harmer who resigned after long and loyal service to WAY. Quentin wrote a reflective letter to us all, an extract of which we would like to share with the Beach community:

"After ten years as a Trustee of WAY, several of them as Chair, I have decided that it is time to step down. I have had a great time serving WAY as it has developed - and relished all its joys and a few challenges!

It doesn't seem so long ago that the five Beach churches were putting together the initial proposal for a youth worker for the villages. They, together with the Parish Councils, other local organisations and local individuals committed the funds so that WAY could come into being. Our first plan was to raise funds for a three year period which was as far ahead as we could envisage at that point.

In the first flyer for the project, before it even had a name, we set out the need as we saw it:

'Young people face unprecedented challenges in every area of their lives. They must deal with difficult issues in areas such as drug abuse, relationships, developing sexuality, health and careers. There is pressure to excel in education to access an increasingly competitive job market. Many feel alienated from society and isolated as they take important decisions about their future. Young people are in need of support and nurture in their communities more than ever before.'

Ten years later young people face all these and more pressures as their lives have become busier and more frenetic. The need for effective youth work is as great as ever, and the passion for serving and supporting young people that brought WAY into being is still at the heart of what we do today.

Now it is time for a new chapter in WAY's life as Shelagh Robertson takes over as Chair. I feel that I am leaving the charity in safe hands. I would like to thank all of those whose work and support has helped WAY to thrive. In particular, my thanks go to the loyal group of Friends who have contributed more to WAY than any other single source of funding."

Quentin's words remind us of the origins of, and continuing need for, WAY. It is not only a Youth Club, but a community group whose activities have an

impact on all residents of Waterbeach and Landbeach. As Trustees, we are responsible for ensuring that we continue to provide at least some part of the support and nurture Quentin highlights. We have recently received a written testimonial from the Cambridge Constabulary praising the work our Lead Youth Worker does to ensure that potential problems are resolved before they become major issues. Dave Beasley also provides pastoral support to young people and their families, and visits both Cottenham Village College and our Primary School regularly.

Members of the current Trustee group are: Alan Ball, Debbie Banasczkiewicz, Richard Blake, Ben Bradshaw, Jiny Bradshaw. We have two vacancies – so if you are interested, please do get in touch.

Two Brothers That Went To War

The story of two brave young men from the local area, Laurence and Cecil Chapman (continued from the Autumn 2012 edition of Beach News).

Part II

On the 31st of March 1915 Laurence was admitted to the 81st Field Ambulance at Ypres with a sprained ankle, the next day he is admitted to the 82nd Brigade hospital at Boeschepe and is diagnosed with Tenosynovitis (inflammation of the fluid-filled sheath that surrounds a tendon). Because of his injury Laurence is transferred to No2 rest camp at Boeschepe, spending seventeen days there convalescing until he rejoined his regiment in the field at Ypres on the 18th of April 1915.

In the spring of 1915 the war on the western front was raging around the strategically important Flemish town of Ypres; this battle and its engagements were to be known as the second battle of Ypres, the first battle having been fought the previous autumn.

The allied line bulging out and going around the town formed the Ypres salient. North of the salient were the Belgians; with two French divisions covering the northern part of the salient itself. On the eastern part of the salient one Canadian and two British divisions were dug in.

Laurence and the Cambridgeshires saw some heavy fighting in and around the Ypres salient; the first engagement was at Gravenstafel on the 22nd of April, lasting a day it involved the French. The second engagement came a day after the fighting at Gravenstafel with the battle of St.Julien and involved the Canadians the Northumbrian, and the York and Durham Brigades; this battle lasted from the 24th of April until the 5th



of May. On the 8th of May the Germans attacked the line at the Frezenberg Ridge opposite the 27th Division and Laurence with the Cambridgeshires; the fighting in this area lasted for five days. The final engagement of the second battle of Ypres was the battle of Bellewaarde on the 24th of May which saw failed British counter attacks and a retreat 1000 yards northwards.

In August 1915 the British army began to replace the French troops in the area north of the Somme River; from this point on British troops would hold an area of the Somme front from the south of Arras to the Somme river. The

27th Division with the Cambridgeshires and Laurence would join them on the 9th of September and remain there until the 25th of November.

During the third quarter of 1915 Laurence was granted leave to return home so that he could marry his fiancée Alice Maud Beeby; after the war they have a daughter Cicely Jean who is born on the 9th of September 1919.

On the 28th of August 1915 Laurence is promoted to the rank of 'unpaid' Lance Corporal and thereby second in command of a section.

On the 15th of November the Cambridgeshires were transferred to VII Corps and became the training Battalion for the 3rd Army school at Flixecourt; this was good news for Laurence as it now meant he was going to a safe area behind the lines with decent food and billets! Unfortunately Laurence's time at Flixecourt came to an end on the 29th of February when once again the Cambridgeshires were transferred, this time to the 118th Infantry Brigade of the 39th Division.

The Cambridgeshires moved up into the Festubert & Givenchy sectors on the 16th of April 1916, at the time this area was considered a "quiet" area. The soil in this area was mainly clay and the water table was very close to the surface making it impossible to dig a dry trench, the trench system in this sector was therefore mainly breastworks; these usually consisted of an earthwork thrown up to breast height to give protection to defenders firing over it from a standing position. These types of defences offered poor protection from shellfire especially airburst shells. The Cambridgeshires and Laurence spent almost four months in the Festubert – Givenchy area before on the 26th of August they were moved as part of the 39th division to the Somme.

The Cambridgeshires were now set to go down in military history for the capture of one of the most strategically significant areas of the Somme – the Schwaben redoubt.

The Schwaben redoubt was a most formidable set of German second line defences; it was basically a battlefield fortress composed of mutually supporting trenches, well-constructed field-works and all round defences that were linked. From the 28th of September until the 6th of October the 18th Division had repeatedly assaulted the Schwaben but had failed to remove its German defenders from its northwest corner.

On the 14th of October the Cambridgeshires under the command of Lieutenant Colonel Riddell went forward under cover of a creeping barrage and were soon in amongst the Germans without losing a man. Once Riddell and his men were in the enemy's lap the fight became close, personal and fiercely contested with men killing each other with bayonet and grenade. The Cambridgeshires routed the Germans and dug themselves in on the other

side of the redoubt, by doing this they had managed to avoid the shelling of the position by the Germans after they (the Germans) had lost it. Thanks to this tactic the Cambridgeshires manage to successfully hold and defend the redoubt for a further twenty-four hours before being relieved, having fought off several determined counter-attacks. For such a close fought and intense fight the Cambridgeshires casualty list was light with thirty-two men killed and one hundred and eighty-six wounded. For this days work forty-two awards for gallantry were bestowed on the Regiment.

Fire and Rescue Service

I am writing to inform you that a consultation on further collaboration, up to a full merger, between Cambridgeshire and Suffolk fire and rescue services is currently taking place.

This is your opportunity to give your views on the two services collaborating further in the coming years, potentially up to merging together into one service for both areas. Your views will be included within the full business case, which is currently being put together and is likely to be presented to the Fire Authority and Suffolk County Council Cabinet in the New Year.

You may already be aware that Cambridgeshire and Suffolk have collaborated successfully in recent years, resulting in the first Combined Fire Control in the country. This set up of Combined Fire Control allowed both services to save significant sums of money annually, and with further funding cuts expected in the coming years, it is essential that further opportunities to collaborate and potentially save money are fully explored.

The consultation pack and online feedback form is available on our website (http://www.cambsfire.gov.uk/6667.php). We are keen to receive as much feedback as possible so I would encourage you to let others know that this public consultation is taking place and to fill in the form yourselves and provide your honest opinions. The form does not ask for any personal information.

Message from Cllr. James Hockney

The last couple of months have been a very busy time, working on a range of issues for the local community of Waterbeach, Landbeach & Chittering. Some of which are detailed below;

Bus Service to Ely is back! - It was really heart-warming news that the bus service link to Ely has been restored for Landbeach and Waterbeach.

The community really came together on this issue because so many residents greatly value the service as their way of reaching Ely. Many of you wrote, telephoned and e-mailed Stagecoach to express your feelings on the issue. The petition that Cllr Johnson and I launched received great support with over 900 signatures. There were also a number of meetings to add pressure.

All these efforts culminated in Stagecoach changing their mind and bringing back the bus link - I very much welcome that they did. It really does show that community campaigns can bring success.

There are two buses each day - Monday to Saturday. From *Waterbeach Green* depart at 9.39am & 12.39pm. From *Landbeach Cottenham* turn at 9.36am & 12.36pm. The bus will depart from *Ely, Market Street* at 12.16pm & 5.16pm.

MOD Housing and local facilities – next steps - In November I chaired a Waterbeach Barracks multi-agency meeting at South Cambs District Council. This was to discuss the Barracks related facilities and plans for the empty MOD houses. It was a very constructive meeting helping to open up ideas and dialogue amongst different organisations.

The process of releasing the MOD houses has now begun. In the first phase over 100 houses will be transferred to Annington Homes in March 2013. The plan is these will then be refurbished for either rent or sale onto the open market around the summer of 2013 onwards. South Cambs District Council are looking at the possibility of acquiring some of the MOD properties for Council Housing. I would most certainly welcome this if it does happen - as there are many local people who cannot afford to get onto the housing ladder.

The community has campaigned very hard for the facilities like the golf course, swimming pool and fishing lake. The DIO (Defence Infrastructure Organisation) have maintained their position that the Barracks facilities are closed down with the gates shutting on March 31st 2013. There does seem to be more hope of the facilities outside the Barracks perimeter, like the Buchanan Centre and Beach Hut being taken over and remaining in use. I will report back when these are further progressed.

It is very important that we preserve the Museum displays and history. In the short term these exhibits will be securely stored. In the longer term, it is important we have a permanent place in the community, for all generations to view the great history of the Barracks and the Servicemen & women that served there. This may be a longer term project, but never the less a very important one.

Waterbeach Barracks - looking to the future - Thank you to everyone that responded to the South Cambs District Council Local Plan consultation. This included the Waterbeach Barracks site alongside many other potential development sites across the District. I very much welcome this debate as clearly the Barracks cannot be left derelict following closure in March 2013. But I am also clear that whatever the land is used for must be of benefit and complimentary to the local area. It is important the community is in the driving seat. The second round of the Local Plan consultation will start in January 2013.

Thank you to the near 3,000 residents who signed the petition opposing a new town larger than Ely. As ever I welcome your views and ideas for potential future use/uses for the land.

Shop Local, Shop Waterbeach & Landbeach - Thank you to everyone who is supporting the scheme. We have an excellent Facebook page which is gaining visitors all the time. If you run a local business, then you are most welcome to visit the page and post/comment there. If you are a Facebook user then you can visit the page and tick the 'like' tab and/or share on your profile. www.facebook.com/shopwaterbeachward

It is important that we do all we can to support and help promote our local shops and small businesses in the area. If you would like to get more involved with the scheme then please let me know.

Parking issues locally - There are a number of places in Waterbeach in which there are parking problems. The main one that I have been contacted about is the parking near/on bends around Chapel Street/St Andrews Hill/Rosemary Road. To this end I made contact with the County Council to raise the need for action. Certainly most residents in the area have said to me a small amount of targeted yellow lines at the most dangerous/obstructive places would suffice.

In addition I also met with our Police Community Support Officer (PCSO) John Mason, who has been placing notices on cars parked in obstructive places. This gave me the opportunity to raise a number of other Policing related matters that residents have contacted me about.

Advice from Trading Standards

Borrowing money from illegal money lenders

If you are having financial difficulties or wish to borrow money quickly, it may be tempting to borrow money from illegal money lenders, known as 'loan sharks', who lend cash without asking questions about your financial situation. Trading Standards urge you to avoid such lenders and assure you that there are safe, reliable lenders that you can use.

Loan sharks may call at your door or you might hear about them from other people. At first they seem friendly and helpful and it might seem like a quick and easy way to borrow money. The trouble is that these people usually charge huge interest on their loan, meaning you have to pay back much more than you borrowed and far more than you can afford. With no paperwork to record what you are expected to repay, a loan of a few hundred pounds can soon lead to a demand to repay thousands of pounds and the debt can quickly become too much to ever repay. If you struggle to keep up the repayments, loan sharks may use intimidation, threats and even violence to ensure you find the money somehow. It is believed that around 310,000 households in the UK currently owe money to loan sharks.

Luckily there are safe places you can borrow money from, even if you have financial difficulties. These lenders stick to the law, make it clear from the start the total amount you will need to repay and collect your repayments in a lawful way. Your local Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) can advise you which lenders are most suitable for you. You can find your nearest Bureau by visiting www.citizensadvice.org.uk or by calling 08444 111 444.

The England Illegal Money Lending Team was set up because of the misery and fear that loan sharks cause. Cambridgeshire County Council are working with this team and local District Councils, to tackle loan sharks in the county, raise awareness of them and to support their victims.

If you know of any loan sharks operating in the area, the England Illegal Money Lending Team wants to hear from you. Call 0300 555 2222, text 'loan shark + a message' to 60003 or email reportaloanshark@stoploansharks.gov.uk. Lines are open 24/7 and your details will be kept confidential.

If you already owe money to a loan shark the Illegal Money Lending team can offer advice and support. So don't suffer in silence, contact the team using the details above.

Advice from Trading Standards

Eat drink and be merry this Christmas!

As the party season approaches and we stock our cupboards for the festivities, many of us are also watching the pennies. Everybody likes a bargain, especially when there are presents to be bought, journeys to be made and all sorts of other expenses chipping away at the bank balance.

With this in mind, Trading Standards would like to warn readers about the pitfalls of buying alcohol from unconventional sources such as car boot sales, strangers at the pub, workplace or selling from the back of a vehicle or any other unusual sources.

In recent times there has been an increase in the amount of counterfeit and fake alcohol found in the county. Counterfeit alcohol, just like any other counterfeit product, mimics a genuine branded article and tries to pass itself off as the genuine product. Usually the counterfeit product is very convincing and most consumers wouldn't notice any difference in the packaging.

As well as counterfeit alcohol there are drinks designed to look like new and appealing brands. Often these products do not meet the required legal standards of composition – either having too little or too much of certain required ingredients or featuring ingredients that shouldn't be present at all. Often these ingredients can be harmful to health.

Indeed, both counterfeit and other fake drinks should be avoided at all costs. They may contain either much more or much less alcohol than stated on the label and that is required by law but worse than this, however, is the fact that many counterfeit and fake drinks contain chemicals that are normally used in products such as cleaning products, antifreeze and screen wash. For example methanol, isopropyl, propan-2-ol, acetone and chloroform are commonly found in illicit alcohol.

Needless to say, these products can be dangerous if consumed and pose a risk to health. For example, people have been known to be sick or suffer dizziness, breathing difficulties, kidney damage, blindness and even death after consuming fake alcohol.

Nobody can tell what's in a bottle of fake drink and so the risks are unpredictable. The simple message is to not buy or consume any drink of questionable source.

So if you choose to eat, drink and be merry this Christmas, please do so in a way that is safe and doesn't risk your health or that of your guests.
