

Community Playgroup

Our 2016 - 17 academic year came to a busy and exciting close in July and we are currently looking forward to welcoming our new starters and all our families who are coming back to us for 2017 - 18.

In June, we held our first Parents' Week. We invited parents to join us for Forest School, our weekly visit to the gym and special sessions dedicated to early numeracy and early literacy. Families had a chance to see their children in the setting and to experience for themselves how we encourage early learning in the key areas through play and exploration and to pick up some ideas to support learning at home. The most popular session was a drop in messy activities session where families could join their children getting thoroughly messy with shaving foam, corn flour, sand, water and all sorts of other gloopy stuff of various colours and textures.



July saw us say goodbye to this year's rising 5s with our Leavers' Celebration day. Families joined us for some fantastically fun sports followed by lunch and a presentation of certificates at the Playhouse. We celebrated each child's unique contribution to Playgroup life with a certificate saying just why they were fantastic. This year we had children transitioning to several Primary Schools locally and our staff had worked hard to make sure that each of those schools had a full picture of each child's learning and development to ensure as smooth a transition as possible.

We are open from 9am to 3pm daily during term time and are rated "Good" by Ofsted. We take children from their 2nd birthday. 15 hours government funding is available to all 3 and 4 year olds and to qualifying 2 year olds. We also offer 30 funded hours to qualifying families from September 2017. We are situated in the primary school grounds in the centre of Waterbeach. Supporting our play-based learning, we offer weekly Forest School sessions, regular visits to Waterbeach Library and the school gym and optional French lessons. Tithe Barn

Tithe Barn celebrates Fen Edge Festival

As part of the Fen Edge Festival the Tithe Barn Trust opened the Tithe Barn, in Landbeach, for free to Fen Edge Festival goers on the 24th & 25th June.

There was even a 1969 classic coach to transport visitors from the festival in Cottenham to the barn.

The Fen Edge Festival is organised by the Fen Edge Community Association, a charity promoting and supporting clubs, groups and societies in Cottenham, Landbeach, Rampton, Waterbeach and Willingham.

Gemma O'Shea, Tithe Barn Trust Chair,



says "We were delighted to welcome over 100 visitors to the Tithe Barn over the weekend and we were proud to be part of the Fen Edge Festival this year. Our thanks go to the Fen Edge Community Association for organising another successful festival, and the Tithe Barn Trust is excited to be one of the festival's nominated good causes for 2017. We have to say a huge thank you to Charles too for volunteering to take visitors to the Tithe Barn on his superb classic coach."

Once at the Tithe Barn visitors enjoyed face painting, storytelling, traditional games and introductory talks about the history of the Tithe Barn.

Bringing in the Barn's harvest

In August the Beach Babies' pre-schoolers returned to the Tithe Barn, in



Landbeach, and harvested the wheat they sowed earlier in the year.

The pre-schoolers followed in the footsteps of Farmers and Farm Labourers from hundreds of years ago and harvested their wheat and threshed it in the Medieval Tithe Barn. They separated the wheat from the chaff using flails (or shortened

broom handles in this case!) and beat it on the historic brick threshing floor. They then used a quern stone to grind the grain into flour.

Gemma O'Shea, Tithe Barn Trust Chair, says "It was just wonderful seeing the pre-schoolers get hands-on with history and seeing the Tithe Barn being used as it would have been over five hundred years ago."

The Tithe Barn reflects the agricultural heritage of the Fen edge villages and is an important part of our local community history. Tithe Barns hint at a different side of history, not just the story of the wealthy. The Tithe Barn would have been used to store taxes, a tenth of all crops to the church, the contributions being stacked in the barn for winter threshing and storage.

The Tithe Barn Trust is a small charity and volunteer not-for profit group aiming to save and sympathetically restore Grade II Listed Tithe Barn, in Landbeach, for community use.

We've been working hard; however, we still need your help to save this gem at the heart of Landbeach. The barn is in a poor condition and deteriorating. We believe the Tithe barn, with thatched roof, brick threshing floor and timber granary, to be unique to Cambridgeshire and even of national significance. Over 90% of Tithe Barns have been converted in the UK.

This year we are very pleased to advise 161 children entered the Summer Reading Challenge at the beginning of the summer vacation. The children and parents were delighted with the selection of new books from which to choose and, from various comments, seem to have enjoyed them immensely. To complete the Challenge the children need to read six books throughout the summer break, on finishing each book the child receives a small goodie. On finishing the Challenge of six books they are awarded a diploma and medal, either at school, or delivered to their home. One child has already received her medal/diploma as she was moving to France this week. The whole aim of the Challenge is to keep children reading to avoid a drop in literacy over the summer break. We are looking forward to the Waterbeach Community School stage overflowing with successful children, later in the year, when they receive their medals and diplomas, in front of their peers.

The new bookshelves are now installed in the Children's Non-Fiction section, suitably labelled, and are proving beneficial to children and parents to obtain the information they require. These bookshelves were supplied via S106 money intended to enhance community facilities, paid to parish councils by developers of building sites in community areas. We would like to thank Parish Councillor David Smart, Les Moss - one of our volunteers, and Will Crane - husband of one of our volunteers, for their work in erecting the shelves. Their addition has certainly enhanced both the access to books, and the pleasure gained from them.

We are considering running a book club in the library for children, if your children would be interested in this could you please advise the library. Also a new Adult Book Club may be commencing soon, again if you are interested in this please advise the library staff next time you visit.

At the present time we have two young people undertaking the voluntary aspect of their Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award, and who will very shortly join the other young people who have also undertaken this work and served their community within the library.

Waterbeach Independent Library has been very pleased to welcome many new members as a result of the homes on the old Barracks site being utilised, and other building taking place throughout the community. We look on our library members as friends and if we can help in any way with locating a book from another library, assisting with IT, providing any information or assistance, we will do so. We are in the process of distributing a leaflet to all residents in order to ensure

News from Cllr. Peter Johnson

Bannold Road - The new footpath on the north side of Bannold Road is taking shape. I appreciate it is causing an element of inconvenience to residents parking on Bannold Road while this work is ongoing, but hopefully once it is completed all will be back to as near normal as we can get these days.

Hedges - We do have some properties where the hedges have been allowed to grow and partially obstruct the footpath; they just need trimming a bit more regularly. When a hedge encroaches on the footpath it can make it awkward for pedestrians who use mobility aids to get by without walking on the road. Also people pushing children in buggies sometimes have to go on the road to get by, so if you have a hedge that is growing over the path, think of these people and give it a trim please.

Denny End Road Development - The houses are going up quite rapidly now after the initial problems. There was an issue when the speed limit sign was removed but this has now been replaced and work is going on with not too much inconvenience. This is a development that was refused but granted on appeal; the good thing about this is that these houses are intended for Waterbeach people, or people with an extremely strong Waterbeach connection.

Gibson Close Development - This was refused by the Parish Council but as the case officer at South Cambs was recommending approval it went to full planning committee with a site visit first. I did demonstrate the problems this would cause if approved and residents also made the case for refusal but to no avail. The planning committee approved this application and so 20 houses will be built on this site.

SPD Workshop - I did attend this workshop with several Parish Councillors as this is going to be an important document regarding the development of the former Barracks site. This is a Supplementary Planning Document which helps us to have a bit more say in the style of the development. These include height of buildings, style of buildings, general layouts of open and green spaces, our concerns and means of addressing those concerns. This is obviously early days yet but we have to be on the ball all the time to ensure we do not get something that spoils our village.

Skate Park - Graffiti all cleaned up and business as usual here. It is good to see so many people using it and the spread of age groups using it show how much it was needed and an excellent example of money being well spent.

Chemist shop - Good to see our new chemist shop up and running and how well this blends in with surrounding properties. Good luck to Geeta and her team and a continuation of a good service to our residents needing medical supplies and general medicinal purchases.

Railway Station - It is still on track to have the platforms lengthened by May next year in preparation for the longer trains. This should make it easier to get a seat on the train, making using the train a more pleasant experience. It has been brought to my attention that there are no facilities for parking motorcycles or mopeds and this has resulted in a moped user getting a fine for parking it in the wrong place. I will be contacting the relevant parties to get this rectified.

Keep Waterbeach Rural

I love the summer months and the chance to get out of the old routine and enjoy the longer daylight hours and get out into the countryside which we are so fortunate to have on our doorstep in Waterbeach. Although an apparently quieter time in the village there is much going on in the background.



The Local Plan Inquiry has now concluded and we await the Inspector's report. South Cambridgeshire District Council have been requested to do more work by the Inspector to enable the plan to be made sound. This may mean that there are further public consultations which includes SCDC's modification that the building of Waterbeach New Town could commence with no restriction on building numbers or time constraints. The implications of such a plan may place further pressure on the A10 and other vital infrastructure and essential services. The original plan was for 1400 dwellings to be built by 2031 followed by phased development.

There is currently an A10 corridor study underway which includes the Cambridge Science Park to Ely. This is due to conclude during the Autumn. It is unclear from questions asked whether this will go to public consultation or stakeholders (those with a vested interest.)

In the meantime the outline planning application for 6,500 dwellings on the barracks land by the MOD and Urban & Civic continues to be processed by South Cambridgeshire District Council. It is expected in the Autumn that RLW Estates (other developer of Waterbeach New Town) will apply for outline planning for 4.500 dwellings on greenfield land and to move our railway station from the village to the north of Bannold Road crossing to serve the proposed settlement.

Look out for the public consultations to have your say.

Under a freedom of information request from South Cambridgeshire District Council the Local Plan has cost the taxpayer approximately £1,000,000 so far. One might ask the question should the outcome of the Local Plan and A10 corridor study be considered before any decisions are made on the proposed development of a New Town of at least 11,000 dwellings?

Other planning news the planning application S/2177/16/FL for 20 dwellings to land off Gibson Close has been approved by SCDC planning committee. The application has been recommended for refusal on several occasions by Waterbeach Parish Council. Many objections were also submitted by residents.

If you feel that you would like to have your say as to how the parish is developed in the future please consider supporting the Waterbeach Neighbourhood Plan which is currently being developed. A Neighbourhood Plan is a legal planning document and in conjunction with the Local Plan will always be considered when planning applications are submitted by developers.

Waterbeach Cycling Campaign

In the last Beach News you may have read our introduction to the Waterbeach Cycling Campaign. We set up a few months ago to advocate cycling and other forms of non-motorised transport as the village undergoes significant development over the next few years. We're now asking people to support us by registering on our website www.waterbeachcc.com. As the numbers of supporters grow that'll help to add credibility to our campaign.

Our mission is to make Waterbeach connected, safe and enjoyable for all types of cyclists, pedestrians, mobility scooter users and anyone who wants an alternative to the car. We have developed 5 visions for the village and its connections. There's one each for travel north, south, east and west and also one for the village itself. Details of these visions can be found on our website.

To the north we'd like to see a route for cyclists and pedestrians to the Research Park. It's currently only accessible by car. Chittering, as part of Waterbeach Parish, should also be accessible on foot or by bike.

To the south the narrow pavement right beside the A10 is high risk and intimidating. Slipping off the pavement onto a stream of traffic including lorries moving at 50mph is a real prospect. The recent Greenway drop-in events held in Waterbeach were well attended. The prospect of a Greenway linking Waterbeach and Cambridge has enthusiastic support.

East of Waterbeach is the beautiful countryside and villages to the east of the river. We'd like to see a route for cyclists to these and Wicken Fen. We also support Horningsea residents' campaign to have a cycle path between Horningsea and Waterbeach.

Cottenham is a regular destination for many Waterbeach villagers due to the secondary school that the majority of children attend. Many of the schoolchildren have told us that they would like to cycle to school. This would require a safe crossing over the A10 and a cycle path both of which we'll be campaigning for.

Waterbeach suffers greatly from rat running during rush hour to avoid the A10 congestion. This impacts the primary school with ongoing concerns about safety. We'd like to see safe routes for children to walk and cycle to school.

It's an ambitious set of goals. However, with support from local decision makers and funds from government and developers we're hoping our visions for making Waterbeach Parish and the surrounding area connected, safe and enjoyable will become reality.



There will also be plenty of vegetarian and gluten free dishes on the menu as we try our best to cater for everyone.



Military Heritage Museum

WMHM were proud to officially open the museum on the day of 514 Squadron's annual reunion Saturday 17th June 2017. One of the hottest days of the year!

514 Sqn. flew Lancaster bombers from 1943 to 1945 from Waterbeach, their only base. RAF Waterbeach was built in 1940 and was RAF until pulling out in 1966 when it became the Barracks of 39 Royal Engineer Regiment (Airfield Repair) until they were relocated to Kinross in 2013 and shortly to again be relocated to Catterick a bit nearer to most of the Regiments wider families. Whilst the veterans of WWII become less each year (five managed to attend this year and about 120 people altogether) the families attending the reunion grow proud in the fact that their relative did and sacrificed so much for others. 'Lest we forget' is often said during the reunion day. The reunion starts off with tea and coffee followed by a service of remembrance in St John's Waterbeach Parish Church, where this year a wreath was by Air Vice Marshal Richard Knighton CB in memory of the 437 lives lost from the squadron.

Then it is a dash up to Waterbeach Barracks main runway for the Battle of Britain Flight fly over at about 1230hrs. The Lancaster was not quite flying at this time but never-the-less BBMF sent two Hurricanes and a Spitfire instead, flying over three times in a tight skilful formation,



magnificent! The party then retired to the Studio building on the Barracks for a buffet meal. It is good to have developers Urban & Civic who are sensitive to the feelings of the reunion in allowing use of the Studio and the old airfield. There is a garden of remembrance by the lake which was open enabling people to go and pay their respects.



Following the buffet, those that wanted to, joined us at WMHM for the official Museum opening, jointly and ably performed by Air Vice Marshal Richard Knighton CB and Colonel David Adamson RE Retd. a former Commander of 39 Royal Engineer Regiment at Waterbeach Station.

During the proceedings Chairman of WMHM, Adrian Wright, received on

behalf of the Museum a framed display from Belgium Plane Hunters Chairman Benny Ceulaers of shot down 514 Sqn. Lancaster NN775 over Belgium. This incorporates photographs of the crew who all lost their lives in the crashed aircraft when it was shot down. This could be a article another time for our award winning Beach News.

We are always looking for items from the RAF and RE days for the displays if you have anything to donate please contact us. Particularly we are short of 39 Engineer material and artefacts as most of the museum collection went with them to Kinloss. We are also looking for mannequins (male variety pref.) to display our uniforms on.

The Trustees of WMHM and volunteers look forward to you visiting the museum in the next twelve months. The museum is open on the first Sunday and Wednesday of the month, March to October. We welcome groups to visit outside normal opening times, please contact us. Admission is free but we are pleased to receive donations. Children Society, and I am now enjoying teaching swimming at Parkside and the Abbey. It's a full circle!!

Cambridgeshire Constabulary

Recently there has been a rise in Shed Breaks, therefore here is some advice on shed security.

Consider painting your house number and postcode onto your valuable gardening equipment (e.g. lawnmower, strimmer and tools). This makes them much less attractive to potential thieves as it makes them more difficult to sell on, and also increases the chances of the property being recovered and returned to its rightful owner if it is stolen.

Avoid storing valuable items such as power tools, fishing tackle or golf clubs in a shed. These items should be stored inside your home or a secure garage.

If you have been working in your garden ensure that you lock away tools such as spades or forks when you're finished. Tools left out overnight could be used by an intruder to gain access to your property.

If you don't intend to use the windows in your shed you can make them secure by screwing them shut or fitting window locks. Hanging old curtain or netting up against the window will prevent any prying eyes from seeing what is stored in your shed.

Locks and Bolts - The most effective way to secure shed doors is to fit a strong hasp and staple (also called a 'padbar'). Secure this with coach bolts (long bolts with a smooth head that cannot be undone with a screwdriver or spanner) and lock the hasp over the staple with a closed shackled padlock. You can further protect your shed with items such as 'shed bars' and larger items such as cycles can be secured to shed shackles. These and other approved products can be found at www.soldsecure.com or www.securedbydesign.com.

Secure the shed door hinges with 'clutch head' or 'coffin' screws. These are a special type of screw that once fitted can only be unscrewed with a special tool. They can be purchased from DIY outlets and on the internet.

Mentoring Programme

Could you spare an hour a month to change someone's life for the better? Form the Future's successful mentoring programme for young people (aged 14 to 17) is expanding and they need more mentors to help students fulfil their potential. This year nearly 100 students from eight Cambridge and Ely schools, and local village colleges were supported by a volunteer mentor from the business community. In the next academic year, the number of students is doubling and they need 100 new mentors from different professions to meet all the areas of interest.

Anyone can be a mentor as training is provided. No previous experience is necessary, just a desire to make a difference and willingness to give up to one hour a month.

Alan Robinson who works at the MRC Mitochondrial Biology Unit found the time to mentor and cannot recommend the scheme highly enough: "I will definitely be a mentor again (next year). To see the positive impact it can have for a relatively minor input is absolutely fantastic. I've seen my mentee develop in ways that I had not expected"

Describing his experience as a mentee, a student from Sawston Village College said, "I've got someone I can rely on now. To be able to meet someone like this at an early age is such a good feeling.... she has helped me improve my grades and to think about my behaviour."

How does it work?

Mentors and Mentees are matched based on shared interests and job aspirations. Many of the students are eligible for free school meals, most are at risk of disengaging from education and not achieving their full potential, while some simply lack direction or have a career goal, but no plan for reaching it. Mentors can provide the vital one-to-one support that helps students find a new sense of purpose, motivation and direction.

At the new Bishop Laney sixth form in Ely all students will be provided with a business mentor to help them prepare for their future careers.

Anyone can be a mentor. Mentors receive 5 hours of training from a professional development agency, and Form the Future arrange the matching, the safeguarding issues and the logistics of the meetings (which always happen in school). You will be required to listen a great deal and empathise- providing words of challenge and support once you have built up a relationship of trust.

Form the Future CIC is a social enterprise that is changing the way students learn about, and prepare for, the world of work. In addition to the mentoring, they deliver two major programmes in the Cambridge area: the skills service for the Greater Cambridge Partnership, and Cambridge LaunchPad: a technology outreach programme led by leading STEM employers. 
