


# **STARS** Children's Bereavement Support

STARS is a local charity supporting bereaved children and young people in Cambridgeshire. We would like to say a huge thank you to Waterbeach Community Association for all your help in



choosing STARS as your charity for 'Carols on the Green'. It sounds a wonderful occasion and your generosity will make a real difference in our work with local grieving children.

At STARS, we provide free counselling and support for around 200 children a year who are grieving for a parent, sibling or other significant person. Our prebereavement service cares for children whose parent or loved one has a terminal diagnosis and we support the child leading up to and after their loved one has died. We also offer advice and guidance for families on supporting their children.

We know that without timely support, grief can result in isolation, anger and lifelong distress. Children need time to process grief and make sense of what has happened, although this can be difficult when family members are coping with their own loss. Many children lose their main carer and the remaining

parent struggles to support the family alone. Our counsellors work with the children in their schools using their chosen activities. These can include timelines, books, stories and sand or clay to explore their situation; colouring expressions or making feelings biscuits to identify how they are feeling and scrapbooks, photo frames, memory boxes and sand jars to remember the person they are losing or have lost. Children sometimes

talk through toys and puppets if feelings are painful.

We help the children to tell and make sense of their story; to understand their emotions are normal for someone who is grieving and create their own memories. We help the children develop strategies to cope with difficult situations and overall move on in their lives. In the words of the children, 'STARS stop us from getting stuck'.

All at STARS would like to say a real thank you to Waterbeach for all your kindness and support.

## Waterbeach Feast is under threat

Waterbeach Feast has been a major village event for nearly 50 years. It starts with a grand parade of floats around the village, mostly entered by local groups and organisations. The afternoon entertainment then continues with a variety of stalls and side shows on the village Green and some exciting events and displays in the arena.

Feast Day is always a wonderful village event bringing the community together with everyone turning out to make it enjoyable for both villagers and visitors.

Few villages manage to hold an annual event on the scale of the Feast. This has been a huge credit to the people involved. However next year (2020) there is a real possibility that the Feast may not happen. For it to go forward your help is essential.

With so many community events disappearing across the country, it would be such a shame to see our village event go the same way. I am asking for the whole community to get involved in the organisation of Feast day. Now more than ever we need to pull together as a community ensure the continuation of the Feast.

Do your children look forward to walking in the parade? Do you like watching the entertainment in the arena? Do you meet up with friends and enjoy a pint and hotdog? None of this will happen without more helpers.

To organise the Feast requires a solid team of dedicated people who can spare a few hours a week to make phone calls or to send and answer e-mails and to help with arranging and booking arena events.

Whatever your skill or available time there's something you can do. You don't have to be young and agile, there are many jobs that can be done from the comfort of your own home in the months leading up to the Feast – whether it's helping with bookings, sending out letters, researching possibilities for arena events or publicity.

Help is also required on Feast day itself, especially manpower. A group of volunteers who are willing to work as a team are needed to set up for the event and clear away afterwards.

Unfortunately, if there are no volunteers there will be no Feast! Please come to the meeting to discuss the future of this traditional annual event

# Neighbourhood Plan



The Waterbeach Neighbourhood Plan is now in an advance stage of development. We are working towards finalising the draft plan which will then go to public consultation for comment.

The plan has taken a while to get to this point. The policies that have been written have evolved through comments and suggestions from our community. Since its inception we have held consultations, drop ins and surveys to understand matters that residents of the Parish consider to be of most importance. For example, housing, transport and accessibility to shops and pubs around the green known in the plan as the village heart. Also considered are safe walking and cycle routes that connect our village to the New Town when it comes. Safe walking routes to the primary school are considered as being extremely important. Bridleways, footpaths and green space including the walks along the banks of the river Cam are also in the plan. Protecting our existing services and amenities are also highly rated.

We will be notifying everyone in the Parish when the consultation will start and finish and details of how you can become involved.

A big thank you to all who have supported us so far. It has been a long and sometimes arduous journey but worth it we think.

Our village has many voluntary groups with many giving willingly of their time to serve all ages. Thank you for all that you contribute to village life. The Neighbourhood Plan has been influenced by you especially in the early stages.

Providing home-from-home childcare in the Waterbeach community for 22 years!

Well, it has certainly been a busy autumn term so far, we welcomed all our new intake children and families to WASPS through September, as the Early Years Foundation Stage children started their school journey. The children have enjoyed exploring their new surroundings and are settling in and have been making new friends at the club. As always, our older children have enjoyed helping the younger children to learn the club routines and have been keen to help them, which is great to see!

For those of you who may not already be aware, WASPS is a charity, originally setup by a small group of local working parents with the help and

support of the Head Teacher at the time (Linda Harrison) of Waterbeach Community Primary School. The club was set up as a community group, by local families, for local families, to fill the void for after school childcare in Waterbeach. The club opened in September 1997, originally running from a spare classroom in school. In the



following years the Holiday Club and Breakfast Club were also added to the service WASPS provides and we moved into our current shared premises after securing a National Lottery grant. As a charity, running costs are kept to a minimum and all 'profits' are applied directly back into facility maintenance, utility bills, equipment and staff wages. WASPS is managed by 'The WASPS Management Committee', who are a group of hard-working volunteer parents/carers, in order to keep the cost of childcare low and affordable. We are a well-established community group, with caring and well qualified staff, who have been providing a fun, home-from-home environment, with exciting play opportunities for 22 years now! A milestone we are all very proud of, we are keen to continue providing our service into the future with the support of the community we serve.

This term, the children have continued to build on the work started last term with our Children's Council, this helps to ensure the children have a voice and input into what happens at WASPS. It also helps the staff team to reflect on their practice and we can therefore improve the provision and experiences for the children. There are so many benefits to the Children's Council, including teaching values such as democracy, respect and tolerance. The children at the After School Club have recently been enjoying a project which

they came up with themselves, they have been making a stage from old wooden pallets, to use in the outdoor area. They have been busy sanding it down and painting and decorating it, we look forward to watching the children perform on their stage soon! The children continue to enjoy baking, arts and crafts and loved carving pumpkins ready for Halloween. At Breakfast Club the children have enjoyed team games outside, such as Dodgeball. They have also continued with drawing activities and have been taking part in more role play in the mornings. The children have been exploring nature and the outside area at both clubs. By the time this article goes to print, planning for Christmas activities at WASPS will be well underway!

The WASPS staff team are always keen to attend training to help build on their skills and knowledge and improve the provision for our children and families, the majority of the staff team recently attended the 'Let's Play – Just Play Conference' in November, provided by Cambridgeshire County Council. The team attended keynote speeches by Ben Kingston Hughes from Inspired Children about 'The Power of Play' and 'We are all Superheroes'. We

enjoyed two workshops; 'Inclusive Play Spaces' which provided us with great ideas regarding supporting children with SEND in our setting and 'Essential Risk and Challenge' which really inspired us all and highlighted the importance of providing risky play for the children at our club. We got to participate in some fun and challenging activities ourselves, which



provided ideas for resources and their uses in our setting, we look forward to putting what we have learned into practice.

We are pleased to report, at our Annual General Meeting (AGM) on 3<sup>rd</sup> October, we were able to form a new WASPS Management Committee made up of parents and carers. At the AGM all members of the previous committee stood down, we would like to express our thanks to them for all their hard work for the club over the past year.

There are currently job opportunities at WASPS to work at our Breakfast Club and/or our After School Club, there are also opportunities to work extra hours at the Holiday Club too. Please visit our website or contact Flor (WASPS Manager) for further details. All positions are subject to satisfactory references and an enhanced DBS check.

We have recently said farewell to Alicia (Playworker), we thank her for all her work for the club and wish her all the best for the future, Alicia will remain on our Bank Staff, so we hope to still see her from time to time. Katrina (Playworker) has also recently left our bank staff, she has been helping to cover at the Breakfast Club this term, we would also like to wish Katrina all

the best for the future and thank her for all her work at WASPS too. Both Alicia and Katrina have worked at all of our clubs over the years.

Holiday Club - Our next Holiday Club sessions will run in December and January (During the school Christmas holiday period), planned dates are Friday 20<sup>th</sup> December 2019 (school training day), and Monday 6<sup>th</sup> January 2020 (school training day). The club is open to 4-11-year olds, 8 a.m. - 6 p.m. for a full day. We also offer flexible booking with half day sessions and bookings for a minimum of 2 hours. Half day sessions can also be extended on an hourly basis and a sibling discount is available. Snacks and drinks are provided throughout the day, but a packed lunch is required from home please. Bookings must be made in advance and families must be registered with WASPS.

Breakfast Club runs from 7:45 a.m. - 8:50 a.m. and After School Club runs until 6 p.m. on all school days. Please inquire to find out availability and book a place. We currently have some spaces available.

wires, tunnelling and high ropes, as well as exploring space and planets with other girls from around the region.


#### Thank You!

# **Keep Waterbeach Rural**

There is so much going on in and around the village and Parish that it's hard to keep track of it all.

You probably know that South Cambs District Council granted outline planning permission for the MOD/Urban & Civic to build up to 6,500 dwellings on the ex-barracks and airfield. Royal London



Waterbeach Estates are still to gain outline planning permission for 4,500 dwellings on prime agricultural land adjoining the barracks to form the New Town

The Public Inquiry for the planning application by Amey for the Incinerator at the Waterbeach Waste Management Park to the North of the Parish started on 5<sup>th</sup> November to run for two weeks. The Secretary of State has asked for it to be called in so he/she whoever it will be will make the final decision. Many concerned village residents of Waterbeach and other villages, Waterbeach Parish Council, Cambridge Friends of the Earth and the Campaign to Protect Rural England have all objected, made representations and spoken at various meetings against this application. Thank you all for standing by the courage of your convictions and for all your hard work, you know who you are!!! If Amey win the appeal it will mean waste being burnt 24/7. Waste will be imported from at least eleven counties in the Country. The body of the Incinerator will be two and a half times larger than Ely Cathedral with an eighty metre chimney spewing pollution onto the land and watercourses. It is unknown the effect the emissions/heavy metals will have on human health or contamination of land and water as deposits build up over time.

Since South Cambs District Council's now adopted Local Plan, which was started to be developed in 2011/12 much has changed regarding climate change. We know that by 2050 this area could be under water (around the time that the New Town, approx. 33,000 population is due for completion). Reports by organisations such as the Intergovernmental Panel for Climate Change and Climate Central predict a rise in sea levels. The Chief Executive of the Middle Level Drainage Board has said that the predictions COULD be over stressed. He also states that flood defences will prevent flooding. Can he be that certain? https://www.cambridge-news.co.uk/news/local-news/underwater-coastal-

We are currently enduring water stress in this area. I am informed that it will take many years of winter rainfall to replenish supplies and not to be deceived by the recent heavy rains. Details here in the Cam Valley Forum Manifesto: https://camvalleyforum.uk/river-cam-manifesto/

Who will take responsibility to ensure that people, communities and the environment now and in the future are protected and considered over political targets and developer/investor profits? We cannot keep "mitigating" to fit a quart into a pint pot! Or a litre into half a litre. It does not add up! Jane Williams

# Waterbeach Youth Club (WAY)

#### New funding offers more detached youth work opportunities

Waterbeach and Landbeach Action for Youth (WAY) is an Open Access youth facility operating 2 nights a week, Wednesday and Thursdays 7-9pm at the Tillage Hall. The youth club is open, free of charge,



to any secondary school aged child who can sign in and out of the club as often as they please. Youth workers run activities and informative talks in the Tillage Hall and members also have access to a music room, snooker tables, TV and game consoles. Youth Workers are responsible for the safety of members whilst they are in the building or engaged in organised outside activities.

This way of operating has proved very popular with the young people and we are now engaging with an average of 25 young people each night. However, some parents of younger members are concerned that even if they tell their children they must stay in the youth club, some choose to wander out of club and around the village. To try and safeguard young people who are wandering around the Rec and beyond, we have successfully applied for grants to provide Outreach Youth Workers who can go out in pairs and engage with young people away from the Tillage Hall and keep an eye on any antisocial behaviour or dangerous activities. Thanks to the funding from The October Fund and Urban and Civic, we are now seeking applications from experienced youth workers (or those who are willing to be trained) who are interested in these new opportunities. This allows our members to improve their cooking skills and experiment with the ingredients – you'll be amazed at the variety of things we have managed to make with the surplus bread, potatoes and bananas!

## Friends of Worts Meadow

FOWM remain active in helping with the management of Worts Meadow LNR (Local Nature Reserve) and in recording the wildlife present as well as in organising open, public events for adults and children. The meadow and woodland (Bourne Wood) make a great place for a walk or to relax and watch birds and other wildlife from one of our new benches. We have 25 bird nest boxes, three bat roost boxes and a series of bird feeders. The 6 ponds are home to newts and other amphibians as well as a host of invertebrates including water beetles and water stick insects. The summer drought affected the ponds with very low water levels or no water at all. However, they have since been replenished by plenty of rain!

We will be running several public events next spring and summer including a reptile and amphibian walk, an early morning bird walk, pond dipping and possibly bat detection and a fungi survey. Join our mailing list to receive details. There is also a recording book on the main wood entrance gate to note the wildlife you have spotted.

During our work parties we carry out a variety of activities such as scrub clearance, maintaining the ponds and bug hotel, cleaning out nest boxes (November), surveying for birds, orchids and reptiles and drinking coffee! ### Tithe Barn Landbeach

The Tithe Barn Trust is ecstatic that they have secured a National Lottery Heritage Fund grant of £98,900, the final funds needed for the urgent repair

works to begin on the unique timber frame Tithe Barn in Landbeach.

Made possible by money raised by National Lottery players, the grant will mean that a skilled team of craftsmen of Thatchers and Carpenters can set to work carefully restoring and repairing the building which is believed to date from the medieval period.



Tithe Barns are increasingly rare

in the UK and the Landbeach Barn is the only one remaining in Cambridgeshire with so many historic features including an elm timber frame, thatched roof, timber granary and brick threshing floor.

The Tithe Barn Trust is a small charity committed to saving and sympathetically restoring the Grade II Listed Tithe Barn. Key to the Tithe Barn Trust's charitable objective is maximising public access to the Tithe



Barn and education. aiming to ensure that the Tithe Barn has a vibrant and sustainable future. As part of this, the National Heritage Lotterv grant will be used deliver a programme of activities for the public, including hard hat tours, thatching demonstrations, school visits and trial events such as a farmer's market and art exhibition.

Gemma O'Shea, Volunteer and Chair of Tithe Barn Trust, says: "It is incredibly exciting that the restoration works can now start to the Barn. We have been fundraising so that the repairs can begin to save the Barn before it is lost. We have to thank the National Lottery Heritage Fund, the Amey

Community Fund, the Garfield Weston Foundation, the October Fund and the public for supporting such a worthwhile project."

# Fire and Rescue Service



Christmas is approaching! The time of year when we're enjoying a tipple with friends, cooking up festive feasts for the family and entertaining loved ones. With all the fun to be had it is easy to be distracted when cooking in the kitchen.

50 per cent of all fires in the home start in the kitchen and more than half of those are as a result of distraction whilst cooking.

We want to help ensure your festive cheer doesn't go up in smoke this Christmas by sharing our tips below for safe cooking over the festive season:

- Never leave cooking unattended
- Do not cook when tired or under the influence of alcohol, drugs or medication that makes you drowsy
- Regularly clean the grill pan and oven. Built up fat can easily catch fire
- Never leave anything cooking if you leave the house
- Do not leave anything flammable on or near the hob tea towels, oven gloves and even washing baskets can catch fire
- Take care when using microwaves. Fires can start when people put food in too long.
- Oven chips or temperature control deep fat fryers are safer than using a chip pan. If you do use a chip pan, do not fill it more than one third with fat and turn the heat down if the oil starts smoking
- Fire can break out in household appliances so you should regularly maintain dishwashers, washing machines and driers, never leave them on if you go out or go to bed and register your appliances online to ensure you are made aware of any faults or recalls
- Have a working smoke alarm on each floor of your home. If it keeps going off when you are cooking it is probably in the wrong location or you may have the wrong type of smoke alarm
- Never take the batteries out of your smoke alarm.
- If you do have a fire in the house, get out, stay out and dial 999

My name is Diane Robertshaw and I'm the Community Warden working in

Waterbeach, Landbeach, and Chittering.

Community The Warden Service is a local provision for people aged 60 and over. It assists and supports older people to continue living independently at home by daily providina contact (Monday Friday) to bv telephone or a personal visit. It is managed by Age UK Cambridgeshire and Peterborough.



#### What can we help you with?

- Listening to your concerns and linking you to helpful information and guidance.
- · Advice on local community services.
- Small items of shopping.
- Collecting prescriptions.
- · Reading post.
- · Making phone calls on your behalf.
- · Being a listening ear and having a chat.

#### Free Trial

You are entitled to a two week free trial, however after that period we charge a small fee of £7.00 per week, which is payable to the warden.

If you are interested in joining the scheme call the warden on 07977 219403. She will be pleased to meet you to discuss the service in more detail.

The service can be ongoing or short term, depending on what you need. The Warden isn't a domestic helper or a carer providing physical care. She is employed and paid by Age UK Cambridge and Peterborough and can't undertake tasks on a private basis.

Age UK provides other services including, handyperson (fitting of keysafe, grab rails, small repairs etc), information and expert advice. Other services include personal call alarms, stair lifts, insurance policies with no age limit, funeral plans and will writing.

# **Open Arms**



There's thought to be 50,000 people at risk of loneliness in Cambridgeshire, so chances are some of them live near you. With winter approaching, life may get lonelier; we all tend to stay indoors for longer. For some people, ill health and bad weather may confine a greater number to their homes, the fear of falling in icy weather and darker nights mean they're too nervous to go out. Working neighbours may be out all day, so they'll see few people during the week.

Villages are great at keeping the community connected, though it's easy to overlook the impact of seasons. In winter, timing events or meetings in daytime, or providing door to door transport, can help to prevent isolation. Helping with shopping, especially bulkier items, gives an opportunity for a chat, or sharing a treat.

So, making connections, however small, can mean so much, whether it's smiling, chatting at the checkout, catching up with friends by picking up the phone or contacting them through social media. Keeping connected by knowing what is happening in your community gives a sense of belonging which improves wellbeing.


