Walking along the riverbank between Bottisham Lock and The Bridge at Clayhithe you can look across the river and see the Cam Sailing Club; with its beautiful grounds, boats, clubhouse, chalets and caravans; it's a lovely setting to enjoy boating.

The club is at its quietest now, but not closed. The sailing cruisers have been moved from their river moorings and are now out of the water and most of the wooden dinghies are stored in the sheds. However, CSC members can still visit and enjoy the peaceful setting; there is the opportunity to work on their boats, go for a walk or just sit and enjoy the scenery, have a picnic maybe and go for a sail if they wish.

The last race of the 2021 season was held on Boxing Day and despite it being a rather gusty, cold day twelve entrants signed in and competed for the Frostbite Spoon trophy.

February is the month when members help with work on the grounds and pollarding trees along the riverbank, ahead of the club events starting in full in March.

March, April and May 2022 - programme of talks resume

Wednesday 23rd March 2022, 7.30 for 7.45pm - Coping; with Plague, Public health and epidemics in pre industrial Europe.

The Speaker is Professor John Henderson (local Historian) Professor of the



Italian Renaissance Emeritus Fellow of Wolfson College, Cambridge. We are sure this talk will be of great interest. He will bring copies of his latest book Florence Under Siege; John Henderson Yale University Press, 20 Aug 2019 - 363 pages.

A vivid recreation of how the governors and governed of early seventeenth-century Florence confronted, suffered, and survived a major epidemic of plague.

Plague remains the paradigm against which reactions to

many epidemics are often judged. Here, John Henderson examines how a major city fought, suffered, and survived the impact of plague. Going beyond traditional oppositions between rich and poor, this book provides a nuanced and more compassionate interpretation of government policies in practice, by recreating the very human reactions and survival strategies of families and individuals.

From the evocation of the overcrowded conditions in isolation hospitals to the splendour of religious processions, Henderson analyses Florentine reactions within a wider European context to assess the effect of state policies on the city, street, and family. Writing in a vivid and approachable way, this book unearths the forgotten stories of doctors and administrators struggling to cope with the sick and dying, and of those who were left bereft and confused by the sudden loss of relatives.

Wednesday 27th April 2022, 7.30 for 7.45pm

1816: The Year Without Summer: A global catastrophe. A local story.

Join Waterbeach celebrated author and Costa-shortlisted novelist, Guinevere Glasfurd-Brown, as she discusses her second novel, *The Year Without Summer*, the story of the Tambora eruption and the devastating climate crisis that followed.

1815, Sumbawa Island, Indonesia, Mount Tambora explodes in a cataclysmic eruption, killing thousands. Once a paradise, the island is now solid ash, the surrounding sea turned to stone. But worse is yet to come: as the ash cloud rises and covers the sun, the seasons will fail. Told from several points of view, including Mary Shelley, artist John Constable and

Littleport rioter, Sarah Hobbs, *The Year Without Summer* is the story of the books written, the art made; of the journeys taken, of the love longed for and the lives lost during that fateful year. Six separate lives, connected only by an event many thousands of miles away. Few had heard of Tambora - but none could escape its effects.

Guin will bring a few books for purchase and would, no doubt, sign a copy for you.

Three of our ladies did a tabletop sale in Landbeach Village Hall on January 22nd, although this was not a roaring success, I would like to thank Carole Holdsworth, Rose Lawrence and Eve Daily for all the hard work they put in for this event.

We are now looking forward to our trip to Brick Lane Theatre in east London for an adult pantomime! This will prove to be hilarious if the last one I saw is anything to go by!

Our programme of trips for this year includes a trip to Cadbury World as well as Bourton-on-the Water, later in the year. We will be going on trips every month throughout the year. If you would like to know more come and join us every Friday afternoon at 2pm at the Beach Social Club. We look forward to seeing you.

Waterbeach Surgery

I would like to say a big thank you to the many patients who have taken the time to write to us, to Waterbeach Babble and to call into the surgery to make positive comments about the care you have received from our team. It means a lot to both our clinicians and admin staff as we all see these comments and it does have an impact.

Please be aware that the Practice doors continue to be open, with strict measures in place. Please wear a face covering when attending the surgery, and sanitise your hands when entering the building. We continue to clean the waiting room chairs regularly.

We have recently been inspected by the CQC in December. The practice remains in 'requires improvement'. The full inspection report can be seen on the surgery website. The feedback from the inspectors was generally complimentary. The CQC recognises we have made significant progress in every area, but we still have a few improvements to make in certain processes. We have a plan we are following to enable us to ensure these processes are in place.

We continue to increase our staffing levels and we are currently recruiting another GP, Nurse Practitioner and 2 reception team members.

As you are aware the Practice does need more rooms so we can accommodate these new members of staff. We are looking to convert a staff room into a new clinical room and the old phlebotomy room into a phone/computer hub. Hopefully, it will be approved shortly and completed by Spring.

Looking at current systems, we have now introduced a new process for Medical Insurance reports. We will be using a third party to complete these reports and for this we need consent from patients. The details are available on the Practice website.

We will also be introducing an improved text messaging system. This will give us the ability to send appointment reminder text messages, with an option for you to cancel if you no longer need it. We hope this will reduce high Did Not Attend (DNA) levels. This new system will also allow us to send a Friends & Family Feedback test to you once your appointment is complete. It will enable us to monitor your feedback in a more precise way. This will be starting at the beginning of March 2022.

When you have a GP telephone appointment please can you ensure that you have your mobile with you at all times and that it is not on silent. He/she will ring at least twice.

Over the Christmas bank holidays we were let down with our phone lines not being set to the Out of Hours number. Our telephone provider did not action the switch over and they have apologised for this inconvenience.

Please be aware that we will be only issuing prescriptions for 28 days as set out in the CCG (Cambs and Peterborough Commissioning Group) guidelines that you may have noticed on your latest script. This is to give the best possible balance between patient convenience, good medical practice and minimal drug wastage. From January 2022 we will no longer prescribe medications that can be purchased over the counter. This is because of government policy to reduce the amount of money the NHS spends on prescriptions for treating minor conditions. We will be sending a letter to affected patients in the next month. If you are wanting help or advice about this please ask. There has also been some confusion with dosette boxes over the Christmas period which we are working with the CCG and the local pharmacy to resolve. Again they have to be for 28 days.

Over the last month we have had calls from patients regarding dentistry. Unfortunately GPs cannot assist patients with dental concerns. You need to be registered with a dentist. We are sorry we cannot issue antibiotics for any

patients. We recognise that sometimes it is unavoidable that an appointment may be missed; you will be phoned or sent a letter to follow this up. If you do not attend on three occasions you may be asked to register at another practice. The new messaging should help this not to be needed.

Just a gentle reminder that the practice operates a zero tolerance policy on aggressive and abusive behaviour. If you are rude, aggressive or abusive to any member of the team you will be warned via letter of your unacceptable behaviour. If this happens again then I will have no choice but to remove you from the Practice list and you will need to register at another practice. We can serve you best when there is good communication.

The surgery team are feeling very positive about our ability to take care of our Waterbeach community. If you have any concerns about your care please contact me at the surgery straight away by phone or by the feedback link on the Waterbeach surgery website. Bruce Abel - Operations Manager

Percy R. Salmon (1872-1959)

The life and career of a Waterbeach man born 150 years ago is being celebrated this March by the Royal Photographic Society.

Percy R. Salmon, a photographer, journalist and author, was a fellow and member of the RPS for more than 60 years.

To celebrate the 150th anniversary of his birth at a cottage in Way Lane, Waterbeach on 12th March 1872, the society has commissioned an online talk to highlight his many achievements. Among these, Mr. Salmon was:

- a travelling photographer for the eminent photography firm of Lévy & ses Fils of Paris including a sixmonth trip to Egypt, Palestine, Turkey and Greece in 1898.
- appointed Editor of the weekly paper *Photographic News* in 1901 at the age of 28, a post he held for five years.
- a successful freelance journalist who supplied articles to nearly 70 different titles and publications.
- the author of many popular books, notably All About Photography: How to Make Good Pictures published in 1925 by Ward, Lock & Co.

The RPS talk is the culmination of research into his life by members of his family, notably his great nephew Stephen Martin and great-great niece Helen Barber.

Mr. Salmon's early life in Waterbeach is reflected in a photograph of the



cottage where he was born and lived with his grandparents for several years.

It was here, he later recalled, that his grandfather started "a night school for adult farm hands who desired to learn to read and write and do a little arithmetic.

I well remember some years later, as a child, acting as a sort of monitor and listening to what he told his aged pupils, several between 60-70 years of age.

It was at those meetings – no charges made for instruction, and smoking allowed – that I learned how to read and write."

By the time he was nine years old, Mr. Salmon had left Waterbeach and rejoined his parents' fast-growing family in Cambridge.

There, his father William joined the borough police as a constable, serving in the force for 25 years. His uncle was also a police officer, rising to the rank of superintendent.

Research for the talk has revealed new information about his role as a domestic servant in Cambridge during his teens as well as his later career as a photographer, journalist and author in London.

After retiring in 1927 to Melbourn, Cambridgeshire with his wife Eliza (née Dickerson of Little Abington), Mr. Salmon died in 1959 at the age of 87.

What's in a name?

Waterbeach is named and recorded in the Domesday Book of 1086 Waterbeach | Domesday Book (opendomesday.org) Nine hundred and thirty-five years later Waterbeach New Town has been formerly named Waterbeach after a consultation organised by developers Urban & Civic and Royal London Waterbeach Estates (RLWE). Excerpt taken



from here: New town formally named Waterbeach - Waterbeach Barracks "The formal adoption of the name took place at a Cabinet meeting at South Cambridgeshire District Council today (Friday 30 July 2021) after councillors considered a report by the two developers of the new town - Urban&Civic and RLW - who ran the consultation process." Waterbeach was formerly named Waterbeach Village at the same meeting. Planning permission has been granted for 11,000 dwellings for the Town. It will take twenty plus years to build out. When planning permission is granted it is an agreement between the Local Authority and developers by way of conditions and S106 agreements to ensure the provision and funding towards services such as schools, doctors, water, sewage, roads etc. Urban & Civic's barracks land development of 6,500 dwellings and associated buildings ref: S/0559/17/OL has been fully approved by a decision notice issued on 27th September 2019. Details of the application can be viewed by entering S/0559/17/OL into the simple search box on the Greater Cambridge Planning Portal. Simple Search (greatercambridgeplanning.org) The RLWE planning application for 4.500 dwellings and associated buildings ref: S/2075/18/OL has not been formerly approved (at the time of writing) as a decision notice has not been issued. The application can be accessed by entering S/2075/18/OL into the simple search box on the Greater Cambridge Planning Portal: Simple Search (greatercambridgeplanning.org) RLWE has been granted planning permission to relocate Waterbeach station from it's current site to the New Town to the north of Bannold Road ref: S/0791/18/FL. The decision notice was issued 9th January 2020 and can be viewed using the simple search box Greater Cambridge Planning Portal : Simple Search (greatercambridgeplanning.org) by entering S/0791/18/FL.

So nine hundred and thirty five years after Waterbeach was named and recorded in the Domesday Book in 1086 what makes and shapes community, the land, the natural world, the sense of home and place set on the edge of the Cambridgeshire Fens now and in the future?
