



## **Community Association**

As always I'd like to start the autumn edition of the Beach News by looking all the way back to last June and the Waterbeach Village Feast.

We've been very lucky all the years I've been involved with organising the Feast, as we've had good weather on the day which has helped to bring people out into the sunshine and let them enjoy the entertainments we put on. This year looked like it was going to be different with the weather forecast going from bad to worse as the day approached. With a yellow warning for rain and thunder in place the morning dawned with a degree of trepidation. However, once again our luck held out and the weather was good, a slight shower early on lead into a great day again. We did have an almighty rain storm after the day was finished, but thanks to everyone involved the whole event was packed up and cleared away before it started and the only casualties were a few traffic cones floating away down the gutters.

The Feast opened in the traditional way with a performance from Waterbeach Brass. With a few spots of rain about the crowd was slow to build, but came out in numbers for the parade. Following on from the brass band we had a

full day's entertainment in the arena, with dancing from Rosewood Dance Academy, Swara Nritya school of arts, Waterbeach Primary School Dance Club and JDz Dance club interspersed with displays from Jazzercise and Milton and Waterbeach Tang Soo Do. The Finale of the Tang Soo Do performance just before the parade was definitely one of the day's highlights, although I can't deny looking away at the final moment and thinking of the impending insurance claim. Thank you very much to all the arena performers for such a great show, thanks also to our two new announcers, Mark and Chris and to James for organising the entertainment and keeping it running smoothly.

As I said earlier, the parade brought out the crowds and it was a great parade this year. Our theme has progressed through the alphabet to 'Q', possibly

tricky. However we went with it and our groups did not let us down with some great imagination and inventiveness on the group's themes. One of my personal favourites was Quentin Blake. In amongst the fantastic costumes we had a new type of entry this year – the bike float and these added something extra to the parade, especially the winning entry from Summer at the Beach. Thank you to all those who



took part in the parade, and the costume makers and group marshals. Thanks also to all the traffic marshals who help with the road closures. Thank



you as well to Jonathan and Andy for all the organising. Each year we hold a collection during the parade for a local charity. This year the nominated charity was the Ely Foodbank, and thank you to all of you who made a donation. You outdid yourselves this year raising a massive £438.40, almost

£100 pounds more than last year.

On the music stage this year we decided to reduce the number of bands and play slightly longer sets. This allowed us to have three great performances and still keep our musical variation. Starting with the jazz music from Transposition, we moved to local solo singer and songwriter Gemma Bearpark and rounded off the day with some pop and rock from Just Jamming. Thank you to all the bands for taking part, thank you also to Blue

Shed for the equipment hire and the help with setup and clearing away in the rain. Thanks also to Clare for doing the announcements and Just Jamming for helping and lending us the drum kit. Thank you also to Jeremy for organising and sound engineering.

The Feast would not be complete without all the stalls and activities run by all the local groups. Each year I wonder just how many hours of time and effort are put in by all of you and I'm so grateful we live in a village where this can happen. That is down to you all so thank you all for that. For the first year almost all our food trucks were from local companies, I hope we can keep that going in future years.

Thank you to this year's sponsors, we can only provide the range of entertainment at the Feast thanks to your donations; Acacia Tree Surgery, DFK-Systems and Thalia Waste Management.

A final set of thanks go to the organising committee Adrian Wright, Pam Clack, Fiona Thomas, Gregory Noble, Holli Bielby, James Smith, Jeremy Brookman, Jonathan Taylor, Marie-Camille Grangier, Norman Setchell, Wayne Love and Zoe Badcock. The committee are involved at all stages of the event from initial ideas, planning all the way through to running the event

on the day. I said when I took on the Feast that I would run 4-5 events and then hand it over to someone else. I've done four years now and feel like this is the right time to hand the Feast on. I think



this is good for the event, new people bring new ideas and this helps to keep up to date and in touch with the village. I enjoy working with the committee to organise the Feast but I do not feel like we had enough people to do the job as well as it should be done. We really need some additional help on the Feast committee; the meetings are informal and held at the Beach Social Club and while a lot of planning goes on it is entertaining and rewarding as well. The next Community Litter Pick is scheduled for Saturday October 18th, please come along and help out. We meet up at 10 am at the Community Rooms (next to Waterbeach Military Heritage Museum) and pick litter for a couple of hours, refreshments are provided afterwards. I would like to finish by saying thank you, firstly thank you very much to a local business who supported us this year both financially, and with some resources and Easter eggs for the children, we truly appreciate you and all that your kindness enabled us to do. #### **Foodbank**



#### Waterbeach Distribution Centre (part of Ely Foodbank)

As part of our ongoing support for Trussell's 'Guarantee our Essentials' campaign, members of Waterbeach Distribution joined 600 other campaigners at Westminster in June for Lobby Day. Together with representatives from food banks across the four nations of the UK, other food

community organisations, charities and people with lived experience, we came together to tell MPs why no one should go without the essentials and to urge them to take action.

We gathered in the Emmanuel Centre behind Westminster Abbey, and the day started with a rousing welcome from Trussell CEO Emma Revie. We listened to stories of hardship from people with lived experience and reflected on our shared purpose in calling for an Essentials Guarantee. The day continued with workshops and an opportunity



to talk with others from across the country who are campaigning for real change to our social security system.

Throughout the day, delegates from each region or nation attended Parliament to meet with their MPs. Our East of England turn came in the afternoon and we joined the mass of people gathered in Westminster Hall. We were delighted to be able to meet with our MP, Charlotte Cane and we enjoyed a long and fruitful discussion.

When signing up to Lobby Day, Trussell were very keen that we ran a Community Conversation in our foodbank, and this we held in May. We sent invitations to our referral partners, local charities, local churches, our school, Parish and District Councillors and to some of our service users. We ran the event after our foodbank session with lunch for our guests. People shared their insights about the challenges faced by the people they either worked with or met through a voluntary role. We discussed the fact that Universal Credit drives hunger and hardship in our community and highlighted the need for an Essentials Guarantee. We invited both those present and those unable to join us to sign an Open Letter to their MP, showing the growing consensus that change is needed to social security in order that it protects people from going without the essentials. During our session, attendees were also encouraged to complete a postcard on which they could share insights about the hardship they see through their work or their volunteering and then explain how an Essentials Guarantee would help their community. When we met with Charlotte, we shared both this letter and postcards with her.

Both the Community Conversation and Lobby Day were challenging, but



behind all that we were driven by our passion to support the people we see in our community and in our foodbank, along with a belief that things can change for the better, but only if we shout loud enough.

## Sustainability at St. John's

St John's Church is a familiar sight for those travelling to the station or towards Clayhithe and Fen Ditton. We could describe St John's as an

ancient parish church (since 13th century) and now a Grade II\* listed building. Many come to St John's to remember loved ones or to reflect on the history of the village. St John's is rare in having two First World War memorials one outside we celebrate Remembrance where Sunday each November, and one inside more personal and with more detail. John's has the Churchyard and is also responsible for the Old Burial Ground (burials ceased when the Village Cemetery was opened the late 19th century).



But St John's is also a busy place, with toddler groups, uniform organisations, village and community groups as well as the Sunday and mid-week services. At St John's we are concerned to keep the Church modern and also, as much as we can, to make its life and buildings sustainable. So, St John's is a member of Eco Church - a national initiative run by the charity A Rocha which encourages faith groups to work to sustainability goals. St John's achieved Silver level under the Eco Church scheme and we are on the journey to Gold, and it's a challenge.

We believe that the faith groups can and must do their best to show care for the created world and to make our experience known to the wider community.

Here are some of the things we are doing or have done to lessen our impact on the environment and to increase the richness of plants and wildlife in our churchyard (and the old burial ground).

- In 2021 we equipped the church with an LED lighting system
- In 2022 we installed a heat pump in the Churchroom with assistance from the South Cambs Zero Carbon Communities Fund
- Since 2023 we have made the environment a focus during our celebration of creation and harvest
- Since 2024 we have been managing the Churchyard as a meadow

We are now planning to replace an old bitumen covered area of flat roof over part of the Churchroom with a green roof. By "green roof" we mean a roof whose top layer is planted out with a variety of sedum. The advantage is a roof that actively cools. An old-style roof can get very hot in the sun and warms the building. The green roof keeps cool and works to cool the building down during our increasingly frequent spells of hot weather. It's also durable and it will be 30 years before it needs replacing. We plan to collect the rainwater that comes from the church roof, the tower and the new green roof and re-use in the Churchroom for toilet flushing. We're hope to cut our water usage by half.

Apart from the new roof, there is more we would like to do. Fruit trees in the Old Burial Ground to encourage pollinators; a proper wildlife audit of our outside areas so that we know what needs doing to make it better for plants and wildlife; and some new pathways so that everyone has easy access to the Churchyard and buildings.

## **District Councillor Update**

In this update we thought it would be helpful to update you on two topics. The first is about the grants that South Cambs District Council awards and the second is about the proposals for re-organising local government and how it affects us.

South Cambs District Council awards many types of grants. Some of these are from the Council's own funds and others are funding from central government or other bodies that the District Council awards. Typically, it is parish councils, community groups and businesses that can apply for grants. Some grants are open to applications over many months and some are only open for a few weeks.

One of the grant schemes that is open to applications for longer is the South Cambs Community Chest. These grants support voluntary and community groups, charities and parish councils. These groups can also apply for grants to improve biodiversity and help with the cost of living. The Council also has a long running programme known as Zero Carbon Communities which helps communities take action on climate change. At the time of writing applications are open for grants for Community Growing (e.g. raised beds, gardening equipment), Allotment Improvements, and Improving the High Street (which small businesses can also apply for). Further information about District Council grants and grants from other organisations are available on our website https://www.scambs.gov.uk/grants-and-funding.

The second topic is about the proposal to reorganise local government. The government is undertaking a Local Government Review (LGR). This will be the most significant reorganisation of local government in 50 years. They plan to replace district, county, and city councils with single-tier councils (so-called unitaries) by April 2028.

This change means residents will access all services through a Unitary Council, rather than separate County and District Councils. The government believes these changes will streamline services, support economic growth, and facilitate housing development. The current advice is that parish and town councils will not be directly affected by the changes.

The government asked the existing councils for their views on how best to form new unitary councils and to prepare business-cases. Three proposals for Cambridgeshire were shared and a consultation was recently undertaken. Ultimately, the government will decide how councils are reorganised. We'll keep you updated as this progresses.

## Waterbeach Surgery News

**Flu Vaccines** - As we fast approach the autumn, we will start to invite you, if you are eligible, for an NHS flu vaccination. You will be invited to book your appointment in the next month. We will continue to invite people through October, November, December and January.

**Pharmacy First** - Please note the conditions that we can refer you for at the Waterbeach Pharmacy. This is now part of the new NHS initiative of Pharmacy First and is done by a referral from the team at the surgery These conditions are:

- 1. Sore throat 5+ years and not pregnant.
- 2. Earache Children aged 1-17, not recurrent.
- 3. Sinusitis over 12 years, not more than 12 weeks duration, immunosuppressed or pregnant.
- 4. Impetigo not recurrent, over 1 year and not bullous.
- 5. Shingles not pregnant, over 18 years.
- 6. Infected insect bites over one year old.
- 7. Uncomplicated urinary tract infections in women 16-64, not recurrent, not pregnant, no catheter.

**Weight Loss Medication** - You may be aware that from 23 June 2025 Primary Care is now able to prescribe the weight loss injection tirzepatide (often known as Monjaro) under very strict guidelines. The Cambridge and Peterborough Integrated Care Board have set out the following instructions for GP surgeries in this area:

- 1. Your regular GP should not prescribe tirzepatide or similar medicines (called GLP-1 agonists) for managing weight loss or obesity.
- 2. NHS England guidelines say that only people with the highest health risks related to obesity can receive these medicines right now.
- 3. If you meet certain criteria, you can be referred to the Healthy You service to see if tirzepatide might be suitable for you. You may only be eligible if you meet the following criteria:
  - Your Body Mass Index (BMI) is 40 or higher (or 37.5 or higher if you are from South Asian, Chinese, other Asian, Middle Eastern, Black African, or African-Caribbean backgrounds)
     AND
  - You have at least FOUR of the following health conditions:
  - Type 2 diabetes
  - High blood pressure needing medication
  - Heart or blood vessel disease
  - Sleep apnoea needing treatment (such as a CPAP machine)
  - High cholesterol needing treatment

If you do NOT meet all these criteria, please do not contact your GP to ask for tirzepatide. The NHS rules are strict, and your GP will not be able to prescribe it for you right now.

Need help managing your weight but don't meet the criteria?

You can still get support! You can refer yourself to the Healthy You service here: https://healthyyou.org.uk/sign-up/

**Third Party Medication Requests** - In line with ICB guidelines, we regret we are no longer able to accept third party requests from Pharmacies or Appliance Contractors for our patients.

The request must come directly from patients or carers.

The only exception is for dosette patients. Items not in dosette must be requested by the patient or carers.

**Prescription Request over the phone** - Can I just reiterate that we do not take any medication requests over the phone, if you need a repeat then you will need to use the NHS app, online or drop a hand written request into the surgery post box or pop in to the practice.

Please can patients who have a smart phone or tablet device consider using the NHS App, as it enables you to order your prescription online without using paper and it reduces work load for the prescription clerks. You can find the App on the App store or for Android on the Play Store. The practice currently has a 64% take up of patients using on-line access.

Just a gentle reminder that the practice operates a zero tolerance policy on aggressive and abusive behaviour. If you are rude, aggressive or abusive to any member of the team you will be warned via letter of your unacceptable behaviour. If this happens again then I will have no choice but to remove you from the practice list and you will need to register at another practice. We can serve you best when there is good communication.

The surgery team are very positive about our ability to take care of our Waterbeach community. If you have any concerns about your care, please contact me at the surgery straight away by phone or by the feedback link on the Waterbeach surgery website.

## The Sun Inn September 2008 - September 2025

In September 2008, a little-known couple and their daughter moved into the Sun Inn - and pub life was never quite the same.

Andrew and Helen quickly made their mark, giving the pub a heartbeat that



shaped our weeks, months, and years. Thursdays became quiz Sundays brought the much-loved cheese nights, and there were monthly gatherings like cocktail evenings. Then came the annual highlights: the beer festivals the and. of course. unforgettable Waterbeach Pub Olympics.

Before the pandemic, you might have found yourself at the dartboard or watching the match - unless Spurs were playing, or the staff had decided that

darts took priority. All the while, pints were poured from an ever-changing lineup of cask ales, beers, ciders, and lagers. Andrew and Helen's care and pride in their beer shone through, with the Sun Inn proudly earning the Cask Marque every year since 2009.

Their warmth reached beyond the pub walls too. Regulars were welcomed along to outings at Newmarket Racecourse, CAMRA festivals (sometimes even overseas), and the now-legendary ski trips to Andorra, Austria, Italy, and beyond.

In January 2023, Andrew sadly passed away. Since then, Helen has carried on with remarkable strength, keeping the Sun Inn's spirit alive with her ever-

cheerful smile. Theresa stepped in to take over her father's quizmaster duties, and she has made them her own ensuring that Andrew's much-loved guiz nights continue to bring people together. For nearly two decades, the Sun Inn has been more than a pub-it has been a home. а meetina place. and community hub, thanks to Andrew, Helen, and Theresa. Their legacy will be remembered with gratitude and affection long after they move on.



#### What's in a name?

#### Station Road and a few that are there no more.

On 30<sup>th</sup> July this year a small gathering at the station celebrated the 180<sup>th</sup> anniversary of an event which was to have a big effect on Waterbeach. Cake was consumed, speeches made, and a plaque was unveiled. On 30<sup>th</sup> July 1845 the first train from London came through Waterbeach and a good crowd of villagers went to watch as it puffed through the new station. It had taken over 3 hours to reach Cambridge and was on its way to stop at Ely and eventually Norwich.

Six years after the station was opened, the 1851 census records 'Rail Station Ferry Road'. Ferry Road doesn't appear anywhere else which suggests that the Enumerator made up the name when filling in the form and needing to fill in a space.

In1861 the census gives the station address as 'Rail Station', with no street name at all. However, the census entry for the station is followed on the same page by a list of houses in 'Church Street', which starts with a pub called The Fountain and a house called Railway View (Could this be Lode House?). By 1871 the station is in Station Road and there are two pubs, The Fountain and The Railway Tavern. Church Street disappears after this, but a small group of houses remains in 'Church End'. Thereafter Station Road has become permanent in name if not in detail.

When the first passengers arrived at Waterbeach there was no bridge over the river and so anyone wanting to visit Horningsea would have had to go across on the ferry as had been done since at least the Middle Ages. The

walk into the village would have looked very different. Just up from station the there was public house with а brewery, which became The Star, The Railway Tavern came a bit later and all traces of



disappeared when Whitmore Way was built in the late 1980's). The Star (now a private house) was there originally not for the benefit of the rail passengers, but from the time when the lode from the river stopped just opposite (more of this in another story) and boats would come up with goods to deliver.

Walking up Station Road, the burial ground on the left (where the lovely beech tree is) was still in use. St John's church would have looked quite different; the entrance was halfway down the side facing the road as the entrance porch which is there today had not yet been built. From a later map dated 1877 it looks as if the row of houses between the church and Chapel



Close had also not been built as it shows an area of orchard with no buildings on it just fruit trees. Many of the houses familiar to people walking up and down the road today would not have been there but there would have been others as Station Road in the 19<sup>th</sup> century was quite well populated.

The impact of the railway on the village must have been very great. Fresh produce could be sent to Cambridge or London and would still be fresh on arrival. This would have given the village a big economic boost. Other goods could be transported more easily. Cambridge became a place which could be accessible for work or school.

In the 1970's, there was some commuting from the station to Cambridge and Ely and a little to

London but not a great deal; it was just possible to go to work in London but there was very little flexibility over train times. However, electrification in the 1980's made Cambridge and London so accessible that the station is now one of the most used unmanned stations in the country.

When it was suggested that I write about Station Road because of the station's anniversary, I thought it would be quite simple, in fact I have discovered all sorts of threads which I did not have time to follow up properly or space to add them to the story here, had I done so. Thinking about the impact of the station on the village in the 19<sup>th</sup> century and what has changed and what remains has made a fascinating project which I hope to follow up. I am very grateful to Dorothy Druitt for her help with information and an interesting and helpful discussion.

#### **Community Association - Volunteers needed**

Most of the time you don't hear much from the Waterbeach Community Association directly. Its role is to sit in the background and organise various things that help the numerous village community groups to work better and keep in touch with the village. It organises the Waterbeach Feast, at which many of the community groups have stalls, publishes Beach News, including articles from the village alongside adverts for businesses around the village, and organises the Christmas tree and Carols on the Green at Christmas.

On paper it's an association of the community groups and all the member groups can participate in the meetings and decisions made there. However, in practice the member group delegates often spend much of their time with the member groups and finding people from the different groups with time for the Feast and Beach News is not easy.

This article wouldn't normally be written by the Treasurer, but I'm writing this because it falls on me to say a massive thank you to three people who have given their time and talents generously to the Community Association over the last years.

Firstly, Alasdair Pentland has been both Chair and Feast Organiser since the Feast restarted after Covid. It has been very evident that many of you reading this have enjoyed the Feast these last few years, whether just attending, joining in the parade, or even running stalls and Al has invested a huge amount of time behind the scenes, between the event management, communicating with stallholders, running the event on the day, and evolving the event organisation to the current point where it's increasingly a team effort rather than entirely on him. It's a credit to him that not only have the Feast days run smoothly but also we are on a trend where we can see that the Feast can be organised as a group effort rather than relying on massive efforts from one person.

Secondly, Pam Clack has been Secretary for over 10 years and with her husband Mark they have produced Beach News for the last 23 years. Four times a year they have patiently chased people for contributions which they have carefully edited together with the advertisements, organised both the printers and network of volunteer distributors in the village which is far too short a summary for the massive amount of effort that they have put in.

These people are wanting to step back from some of their responsibilities and in the next articles you can find out more information about ways you might be able to help - whether you have been in the village months, years or decades. You'll find out more information in the next couple of articles about some of the ways that we need people to help. If you're reading this please could you have a think whether you could help, or whether you know someone who you could encourage?

But first, let's say thank you to AI, Pam and Mark for everything that they've done for Waterbeach through Beach News and the Feast!

#### Waterbeach Feast

It's not possible to be anywhere near the Green on the first Saturday of June and not notice the Feast! Even on the day before there are the first signs of something happening - as extra bins (and toilets) appear, marks appear on the ground ready for stalls the next day, and the fairground rides start to arrive. Then as the sun rises in the sky (hopefully not hidden by too many clouds) volunteers, groups and caterers converge on the Green to set up the arena, marquees, gazebos, stalls, activities, food and drink vans, that transform the Green from its usual open space to the hive of activity that it is for the afternoon. As the afternoon progresses, the band starts up and the procession makes its way from the school around the Green finishing in the arena with the award of prizes. The arena is busy with entertainment and around the Green people are visiting stalls and the fun fairs, eating, listening to music... As the afternoon draws to a close, the Green empties of visitors and stallholders, and restores itself to the peaceful green space at the centre of our village.

Not counting all the member groups who organise stalls, participate in the parade etc, this happens because of a group of people who together make sure that we have permission to use the Green, the event is well managed to keep everyone safe, the services (First Aid, bins, toilets, etc) are all in place, and communicate with the various groups to make sure everyone is where they need to be. We would love to see more people helping whether with the event planning before the day, communication, fundraising, or event management during the day.

Please do give some thought whether you or anyone you know could join the group organising the Waterbeach Feast. As Al steps down as Feast Organiser we don't expect to replace him with one person, but without new people we unfortunately won't be in a position to organise the Waterbeach Feast in 2026. He will be staying around as Chair of WCA and much of the preparation gets reused from year to year so this should not be too daunting! ## Military Heritage Museum

The musuem tells the story of the former airfield from 1938 when Winfold Farm land was bought for a war time airfield and then the



RAF arrived in 1941. The Royal Engineers took over in 1966 until they left Waterbeach in 2012. The site is now being developed as Waterbeach (New Town).

WMHM Is open on the first Wednesday and Sunday from March to October 10am to 4pm and on the third Sunday of every month 10am to 3pm when there is a Waterbeach Community Market in the former Barracks. Other times by arrangement.

What a great summer we have had both weather wise and from the museums point of view. A number of artefacts have been given to us. Please if you have anything pertaining to Waterbeach RAF and RE years consider donating to the museum. We have been working on the Engineers area, repainting the wooden brown ply display cabinets a sympathetic silver grey to match the new cabinets. Gives a feel of lighter and a roomier area. We are now setting about reordering the whole area, a work in progress! But a number of changes and additions have been made.

One of our volunteers has been 3D printing a diorama of the engineers doing runway repairs following a bomb strike in 5 modules; not quite finished but out on display. We are also running videos of Engineers at work in various parts of the world.

The museum trustees thank the Parish Council for their grant of £1500 towards the purchase of the lime stone carving, 'The Return' to be seen in the museum foyer. Just over half the purchase price of £13K has been raised so far. Can you help us to reach our target?

A new display also in the Engineers area are a number of Clansman radios

which were carried in the field or in the Engineers vehicles – remember that photo in the Falklands a radio with a Union Jack on the ariel? The Clansman family of military radio communications equipment was used by all regular British Armed Forces during the Cold War, including the Royal Engineers and the RAF. The introduction of the various Clansman elements was phased, but the family was in service from about 1979 to 2009.



Clansman radios enabled military users worldwide, in military combat or

peacetime, on foot and in vehicles, to communicate over short, medium and long distances using a wide range of HF and VHF/UHF frequencies. They also enabled troops on the ground to communicate with military aircraft and call in close air support when necessary.

The key benefit introduced by Clansman radios was the ability to dial up the operating frequency at the click of a switch or to change channel instantly. This was achieved by the use of digital frequency synthesisers.

Clansman radio units were installed in vehicles or carried by troops as portables. One army veteran signaller said, "Whilst operating on foot, carrying all weapons, personal supplies and the HF radio equipment, the signaller needed to eat 7000 calories per day, despite the load being shared".

#### David Benton 15.07.1931 - 03.08.2025

Sadly, Waterbeach recently lost one of its most well known, lifelong residents with the passing of David Benton, aged 94 years, on Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> August 2025.

Born to Herbert and Marjory at 'Homeland', 2 Denny End Cottages, Winfold Road on 15<sup>th</sup> July 1931, he was schooled at the Junior School in Cambridge Road before moving up to 'Big' Parochial School, Greenside until 1942.

He went on to attend St. John's College Choir School, Cambridge until around 1946 whereupon he became Assistant Baker to his uncle, Frank Billett, at Station Road Bakery and continued to study bakery via evening classes at the Technical College, Cambridge.

David, having by now qualified as a Master Baker and Confectioner, married Margaret Howard at the Particular Baptist Chapel, Chittering, on 10<sup>th</sup> November

1953, at which point they moved in to and managed Station Road Bakery – Frank Billett having formerly retired.

His National Service (1956-1958) was served at RAF Waterbeach – attaining the



ranks of Ordinary Aircraftsman, Leading Aircraftsman and Senior Aircraftsman/Catering – having trained at No.2 School of Cookery, RAF Innsworth, Gloucestershire.

Son Barry arrived in October 1960, followed in June 1965 by daughter Angela.

David and Margaret continued to operate from Station Road Bakery until David's retirement from the business in 1986. For the following two years he took up a part-time position as a baker for the cafe/tearooms at Anglesey Abbey, Lode, and a move to a new home in Camps Close followed in May

He also managed to find the time to become an active member of both the Parish Council and Village Society – where he was bestowed the title of President in 2005.

He was, most certainly, an authority on all things Waterbeach.

A couple of interesting childhood memories (among many) that he recently shared were of the Feast - where the Showman's/Traction Engines used to queue along Denny End Road (having travelled from Ely) until 6pm when the Village Clerk unlocked the gates to allow them access onto the Green - and of witnessing a German bomber dropping bombs on the airfield on 3<sup>rd</sup> February 1941!

A devoted family man, David is already sorely missed by Barry, Angela and grandchildren Jack, Rebecca and Dan and partners.

## Is your landline your lifeline?

Landlines are changing. By January 2027\*, traditional landlines will be upgraded with digital technology. This national upgrade is known as the *Digital Switchover* and will mean that landline calls will be made over the internet instead of the old telephone network. Telephone providers are responsible for switching customers to the upgraded service, but everyone is encouraged to check if and how the change will affect them.

Do you rely on a personal alarm or telecare device? - It's important to check how the Digital Switchover will affect you, especially if you also rely on personal alarms or telecare devices (like fall detectors or lifelines), which may stop working. For many, the change will be simple. All you will have to do is plug your landline phone into a broadband router instead of a traditional phone socket. But if you don't have an internet connection at home, or if you rely on your landline every day, this change might affect you more.

#### 3 things you can do now to prepare for the Digital Switchover

- 1. Call your phone company Ask if the change affects your phone line or any connected devices. Ask to speak to customer services and use the number on your most recent bill.
- 2. Ask for help if you need it A trusted friend, family member or neighbour can help you make the call to your phone provider or speak to your provider on your behalf.
- 3. Watch out for scams Your phone provider will not ask for money upfront. If something doesn't feel right, hang up and call the official number.

The good news is landlines are not going away, you can usually keep your existing phone and number, and it's the responsibility of your phone company to guide you through the process.

We know that for many people, the landline is more than just a phone - it's a lifeline. That's why **Connecting Cambridgeshire** is here to help make sure no one is left behind.

Don't wait - call your phone provider today.

Local libraries and community champions providing information hubs for vulnerable residents - Recognising that older and more vulnerable residents are best supported in trusted, community locations, libraries are acting as information hubs for the campaign. Every library, including community and mobile libraries in Cambridgeshire and Peterborough have free printed information available about the Digital Switchover. Many devices contain lithium-ion batteries. Mobile phones, laptops and games console controllers have these batteries, but so do cordless tools, garden machinery plus e-bikes and e-scooters. These batteries can heat up and cause a fire if not used correctly.

You can Take Charge and Be Safe by following a few simple tips:

- · Charge batteries when you are awake and alert
- · Only use the battery, charger and cables supplied by the manufacturer
- · Before you go to bed, check anything still charging is switched off
- Do not overload sockets
- Do not charge e-bikes and e-scooters in escape routes.

Batteries can be a fire hazard if they are not disposed of properly. They should never be put in household rubbish or recycling bins.

During the processing of waste or recycling, a battery can be compacted and damaged, which can lead to ignition of the highly reactive lithium, leading to a fire starting.

Any kind of battery can cause a fire if not disposed of correctly and safely. This includes vapes or other e-cigarettes as well as standard batteries.

Fires involving batteries cause damage to refuse vehicles and roads, as well as significant delays to bin collections and road closures.

**How to dispose of batteries** - There are many places to safely dispose of batteries. As well as local recycling centres, many shops around the county have collection bins in-store.
